Greetings!

“Do pipe organs use steam?” I was waiting for the recent BSO concert to begin, which featured Thierry Escaich playing the Poulenc Organ Concerto and the Saint-Saëns Organ Symphony, when the fellow seated next to me started asking questions. He bought a ticket at the last minute since he was a fan of the Saint-Saëns and was looking forward to hearing it live. He was curious how the piece would compare to his recordings. But he had no idea how a pipe organ works. The steam question led to a discussion about flue and reed pipes, sliders and all the rest before the concert began. And then during intermission I heard someone else in the same row reading information about the organ from the program book. At the end of the concert the audience was applauding before the final release.



The BSO discussion reminded me of BAGO member Mitchell Crawford’s introduction to the “King of Instruments” at Old South on this past New Year’s Eve. Mitchell explained to a packed church that a pipe organ is a wind instrument and then he demonstrated all kinds of different sounds to a delighted audience. I had a *deja vu* moment during that event since I first heard the Old South organ at St. Paul’s Municipal Auditorium in MN before it was dismantled and brought back to Boston where it was originally built. The Auditorium no longer exists and the Skinner organ almost met the same fate except for the intervention of several organists and builders. Even though it was in tough shape, I remember the warmth of the Skinner sound in the Auditorium. It was the largest instrument I had ever heard, and it made an impression on me.

When I saw that there were going to be opportunities to hear three different organs on December 31st, I decided to be a proud Dean and get to part of all three events. I raced from Old South to The Mother Church and then hitched a ride with Christa Rakich to make it to Church of the Advent by the third lesson. I walked in to musical fireworks as Jeremy Bruns and Mark Dwyer led one of the sunniest versions of “For unto us a Child is born” in my memory. Close to 2,000 people (1,000+ at TMC alone) heard pipe organs on New Year’s Eve 2019. I have the pictures! Then Thierry Escaich came to town to play with the BSO and lots more

people heard a pipe organ. The past month is one to remember for the Boston organ scene.

The pipe organ is alive and well even though we know that some instruments are struggling. With care and feeding, though, they can endure difficult times and return to glory, bringing their beautiful historic sounds with them. Thank you, BAGO members, for assisting our instruments

Lübeck's Arvid Gast is returning to play at Church of the Advent in a concert of German Romantic literature on January 31st, and then we have our fifth WIMfest with the spectacular soprano Sophie Michaux at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul on February 7th at 7 pm. Prior to the concert, be sure to come for the Members' forum at 6 pm to talk about women composers. Bring music or titles to share, or ask questions along the way.

Born in 1962 in Bremen, Arvid Gast studied Organ Performance and Church Music under Prof. Ulrich Bremsteller at the Hochschule für Musik und Theater in Hannover, Germany. From 1990-1993 he held the position of organist and choirmaster at St. Nikolai church in Flensburg.

Appointed Professor of Organ Performance at the Hochschule für Musik und Theater "Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy" and University Organist in Leipzig in 1993, he remained until 2004 when he accepted the post of Director of the Church Music Institute at the Musikhochschule in Lubeck. He is simultaneously Titular Organist of the historic Stellwagen organ in St. Jakobi Lubeck.

During his studies, Gast had won numerous international organ competitions, and is an oft invited juror for many distinguished international competitions in Europe. His numerous recordings, concert invitations and interpretation courses at home and abroad attest to his abilities as an eminent recitalist and

pedagogue, and is currently a foremost interpreter of German Romantic music.

The longtime President of the Methuen Memorial Music Hall, **Edward Sampson**, passed away on January 2, following a complicated illness of several years. It would be nigh impossible to describe how committed Ed was to the continuance and support of the Music Hall and Great Organ. He had a lifelong passion for classical organ music and organs. He served as President of the Board of Trustees of the Methuen Memorial Music Hall, home of the world-famous "Great Organ," for over 40 years.

ATLANTA IS PROUD to host the American Guild of Organists National Convention in the summer of 2020. With "A Kaleidoscope of Color and Sound," we celebrate the

diversity of experiences, races, ages, and cultures in Atlanta.

As the center of the Civil Rights movement, Atlanta made an impact on the world of culture and music. In this spirit, we are featuring historically significant venues, including Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s place of baptism and ordination, Ebenezer Baptist Church, as well as America's oldest private historically black liberal arts college for women, Spelman College.



Celebrating the Atlanta interfaith community's long and significant role as leaders for justice confronting issues of civil and human rights, the worship services will be held in historic spaces along the Peachtree Street corridor. We begin at Ebenezer Baptist Church, in the neighborhood still echoing the voice of Martin Luther King Jr., moving up the street to The Temple, bombed at the height of the Civil Rights Movement but rebuilt and standing witness for social justice in the city. From there we move on to Peachtree Christian Church, the Catholic Cathedral of Christ the King, and the Episcopal Cathedral of St. Philip. Traditional musical styles and new voices and songs will both reflect the dynamic religious life of the city and inspire our ministry.
