150th Anniversary Concert for "The Great Organ" at the Methuen Memorial Music Hall: May 9, 8 p.m.

A gala, historic re-enactment event will take play on Saturday, May 9, at the Methuen Memorial Music Hall. The Harvard Musical Association has planned a festive concert to commemorate the gift, in 1860, by members of HMA, of the E. F. Walcker and Co, organ, Opus 200, to the Boston Music Hall. The concert, featuring four organists, will be a re-creation of the inaugural program played on the instrument in Boston on November 2, 1863. The program consists of works by Bach, Handel, Mendelssohn, Palestrina, Purcell and Lefébure-Wély, plus the addition of a piece by Herbert Bielawa, commissioned by HMA, entitled *Odyssey*. Organists for the concert will be Mark Dwyer, Brian Jones, Sandra Soderlund and Peter Sykes.

Tickets for the concert are \$30 and a limited number are available by advance mail order. Dinner reservation orders must be received by Mrs. Morissette by April 19. For both dinner and concert, please make your check for \$130.

For all who love the Methuen Music Hall and its Great Organ, this surely is a once-in-a-lifetime event not to be missed. It will be the first time that the inaugural concert on the organ has been replayed. As part of the festivities, this is a Coat and Tie or formal dress event. Wanted: Yearbook Editor(s)

Max B. Miller Book Prize Awarded to Barbara Owen and Andrew Shenton

As part of its goal to encourage scholarly research on music written for the organ, the Organ Library established the Max B. Miller Book Award, named after one of the founders of the Library. The award for 2009 (covering the years 2007-2008) has been given *ex aequo* to Barbara Owen for her book *The Organ Music of Johannes Brahms* and to Andrew Shenton for his book *Olivier Messiaen's System of Signs: Notes Towards Understanding His Music.*

Barbara's book is a survey of a corpus of music composed for the organ by one of the leading figures of nineteenthcentury music. A Brahms scholar who provided an assessment of the book to the award committee noted its broad coverage of "the role of the organ in Brahms's personal life and in the European musical world of the 19th century, Brahms's study of the organ music of his predecessors, the multiple versions of some his own organ works, editorial issues and questions of performance practice, the organists in the Brahms circle, and, of course, the organ works themselves."

A reviewer who provided a detailed assessment of Andrew's book, which takes as its centerpiece Messiaen's *Méditations sur le mystère de la Sainte Trinité*, observed that the book poses "fundamental questions about how [Messiaen's] 'system of signs' works from every conceivable angle: intention, composition, notation, perception, performance, recording, etc." Remarking that it "provides a model for discussing the linguistic and perceptual complexities of how Messiaen's music communicates its theological messages," he went on to praise the book as "a model of how writing about the organ can be made accessible to non-organists."

Nominees for 2009 Chapter Election

TREASURER

Kirk Hartung (Incumbent) currently serves as Director of Music/ Liturgical Ministries and Organist at St. Catherine of Siena Parish in Norwood. He is Wednesday evening organist at the Christian Science Church in Framingham and plays for Jewish High Holiday services. Originally from Washington State, Kirk came to Boston in 1988 to study at Boston University School of Theology, where he studied with Dr. Max Miller, and received his Master of Sacred Music (M.S.M.) degree. In addition to being a member of the AGO, he is also a member of NPM and a lifetime member of The Hymn Society in the United States and Canada. Kirk has served the Boston Chapter AGO in the past as Registrar and currently serves as Treasurer. He finds that participating in and serving the local AGO Chapter is important for all members.

Joel Davidson is a self-employed attorney specializing in social security disability, and organist at St. Brendan Church in Dorchester. He thinks the Boston AGO is a wonderful local institution with strong musical roots and wings; it has a lot to offer the public and greatly enriches the Boston musical scene.

MEMBERSHIP SECRETARY

Timothy Hughes (Incumbent) has held positions at Park St. Church, Boston, and St. Paul Roman Catholic Church, Cambridge, and is currently a freelance organist. His undergraduate studies were at Gordon College and U Mass. Amherst, and he earned his M.S.M. at Boston University and M.L.S. from Simmons College. He has previously served the Boston Chapter as Placement Services Coordinator.

Permelia Sears is currently Minister of Music at Union Congregational Church in Groton. She is a graduate of Smith College and holds a M.M. in Pipe Organ Performance from the Yale University School of Music. She is a past Dean of the Merrimack Valley AGO Chapter, is on the 2013 Organ Historical Society Convention Committee, and is a faculty member of Indian Hill Music Center in Littleton. She has given recitals throughout the Northeast, most recently for the 2008 OHS mini-convention in Vermont and is principal violist with the Arlington Philharmonic Orchestra. Permelia firmly believes that as the future of the Guild lies with the youth we are teaching today, Boston Chapter outreach to young people in its many forms is vitally important.

REGISTRAR

Dan McKinley (Incumbent) has been organist & choirmaster of Christ Church of Hamilton & Wenham since 1998. For nineteen years he was director at First Christian Church, Columbus, Ind., where he played an 81-rank, 1942 Aeolian-Skinner. He has bachelor's and master's degrees in organ & church music from Indiana University and was awarded a Performer's Certificate. He has been broadcast on *Performance Today*, *Pipedreams*, and *With Heart and Voice*. He recorded Dupré's organ & orchestra music for *Naxos*. He serves on the Liturgy & Music Committee of the Episcopal Diocese of Mass., and has been dean and sub-dean of the Merrimack Valley AGO. He continues to learn from other organists, and believes the AGO invaluable in fostering education and fellowship.

Robert DeRegis has been a member of the AGO for over twenty years and maintains dual membership in the Boston and Syracuse Chapters. He is a graduate of Syracuse University and Boston University. Robert serves as the Director of Music and organist of the Needham Congregational Church.

RECORDING SECRETARY

Kirsten Johnson (Incumbent) is Director of Music at St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Newton Lower Falls, where she serves as organist and director of choirs, a position she has held since 1992. She holds degrees from St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota and the Institute of Sacred Music at Yale Divinity School in New Haven, Connecticut. She did further organ study with Yuko Hayashi at the New England Conservatory in Boston. She is also director of *Music Together* of Wayland/Weston, an early childhood music program. In the coming year, she would like the Chapter to focus on increasing membership, especially students and young people, since they are the future of our profession.

Miranda Loud is currently organist at St. Mary's of the Assumption in Brookline Village and has held posts at St. Peter's in Weston and as Associate Organist at St. James' Madison Avenue in New York City for three years where she was a member of the New York City Chapter of the Guild. In addition to being an organist, Miranda is a mezzo-soprano and a multi-media eco-artist. She founded the non-profit Rialto Arts - Where Nature Takes Center Stage in 2005. Miranda would love to see the Guild experiment with more cross-disciplinary collaborations as a means of attracting not only a wider audience for the organ but more potential organists.

AUDITORS

Martin Steinmetz (Incumbent) has been Minister of Music at the Allin Congregational Church in Dedham for 45 years, where he plays the Skinner organ and directs two choirs. He is a graduate of Yale University where he studied organ with Frank Bozyan, and later with Frank Taylor; and is retired from the technical staff at MIT Lincoln Laboratory. He has produced the Boston Chapter's WCRB radio program for 30 years and wrote and edited the *Green Book*, now in its 15th edition. He has served the Chapter as Dean, SubDean, Treasurer, Auditor, Associate Chair of the 1976 National Convention, and is a member of the Library Committee and SPAC since their inception. Martin proposes that the Chapter should have meetings, with ideas presented and shared by Chapter members,

on the never ending work of a being an effective church musician (dealing with clergy, choir members, instrumentalists, music selection, budgets, etc.).

Craig Smith (Incumbent) was organist and choirmaster at the Groton School for 28 years. Previously he held similar positions at the Kent School in Connecticut and St. George's by the River in Rumson, NJ. After receiving his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from Union College he spent a year at the Royal School of Church music before attending Union Seminary, where he earned his M.S.M. He is currently assisting and substituting in South Shore area churches, and serves as Senior Warden in St. John the Evangelist Church in Hingham.

Robert Barney, Director of Music at Trinity Episcopal Church in Concord, Massachusetts since 1994, teaches private lessons in voice piano and organ and also plays organ recitals and sings with the Seraphim Singers. Currently a resident of Littleton, MA, Robert has also served as Music Director for the Boston Gay Men's Chorus (1985-1997) and Assistant Conductor and Interim Music Director for the Treble Chorus of New England, (1999-2006). Mr. Barney has been a member of the AGO since 1973 and has served on the Executive Committee, the Program, Professional Concerns, Organ Advisory and on the Young Organists Initiative Committees. Robert supports the work of the AGO in trying to provide resources, edification and inspiration to those of us in the work of leading the musical prayers and praises of our congregations.

Charles Leinbach currently assists the music program at South Church in Andover and serves as the Music Director for the South Church Players. Originally from Southern California, Charles came east to complete a BS in music composition from Bates College and an MA in computer music composition from Brooklyn College. Charles has held positions in the Episcopal and UCC churches as organist, composer of sacred music and ensemble conductor. He currently spends much of his time running a banking consulting practice for Hewlett-Packard in New England. Charles believes that the AGO plays an important role in guiding the ever-evolving role of the sacred musician. AGO programs and activities need to both prepare its members for the present and the future, but also guide the sacred community to know the role of music in worship and the community.

MEMBERS AT LARGE

Kathleen Adams is Music Director at the Annisquam Village Church in Gloucester and also works at C. B. Fisk where she edits "The Pipeline." She studied organ at Harvard with Lenora McCroskey and for twelve years served as Cantor and Organist at St. Leonard's in Boston's North End. A mezzo-soprano, she studied singing at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago and was soloist for the Italian Colonial Band under Nunzio Cicarelli. She worked for the Unitarian Universalist Association's Section on Social Responsibility for seven years, coordinating the work of her department with that of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee. Two of her students have won scholarships with the Young Organists Initiative and have pursued their studies into college (one at the graduate level). She is particularly interested in the role of the AGO as educator, and in the potential of the organ to collaborate with other artistic mediums. R. Harrison Kelton is currently music director at St. John's Episcopal Church in Newtonville, and associate professor of music history at Suffolk University. At New England Conservatory he was a student of Donald Willing and choral conducting assistant to Lorna Cooke deVaron. At Boston University his dissertation was an edition and study of Christ Church, Oxford, Music Ms. #89, a seventeenthcentury book of organ music for the Roman rite. He was the winner of the AGO Region VI Student Playing Competition and competed in the National Convention in Atlanta. He subsequently earned the ChM certification, for which he won the S. Lewis Elmer Prize. He is also a member of the Anglican Association of Musicians, the Hymn Society of the United States and Canada, and the Organ Historical Society. He currently serves on the boards of the AGO Organ Library at BU and the Old West Organ Society. His career has included stints as organist at Catholic, Congregational, Episcopal, Jewish, Lutheran, and Unitarian churches. If elected, he would be most interested in the areas of education, hospitality and professional concerns.

Christian Lane is Assistant University Organist and Choirmaster at Harvard University. A graduate of the Eastman School of Music and the Yale Institute of Sacred Music, Chris had the privilege of earning first prize in four American organ competitions before his twenty-first birthday. He subsequently earned both second second prize and the audience prize in the 2004 AGO National Young Artists Competition (NYACOP). Passionate about commissioning new music and using the organ in collaborative settings, he regularly performs duo concerts with soprano Jolle Greenleaf in addition to his solo performances. Chris has also been privileged to serve within several of the country's most prominent parish music programs, including the Episcopal Churches of Trinity-on-the-Green (New Haven) and Saint Thomas Fifth Avenue (New York City). Chris believes the AGO's most vital task is to foster and support young organists - not only through successful education programs such as POE - but also through professional development opportunities for young artists (recital sponsorships, competitions, etc.).

Michael Olbash, SPC (BA-Music, Harvard; MA-Music, St. Joseph's College) is the Minister of Music at the United Church of Christ in Medfield, the conductor of the Gregorian chant schola at St. Mary Star of the Sea Church in Beverly and interim choirmaster at St. Theresa of Lisieux Church in Sherborn. He is the President of the Southeastern New England Chapter of the Choristers Guild, was the music director of the 2008 Magnificat Pilgrimage of Hope, and is the founder and conductor of the Stepping Stone Chant Project, an all-male vocal ensemble who recently released their first compact disc recording, "Blessed Is the Ordinary." Michael is particularly interested in maintaining and strengthening the educational focus of our Chapter, particularly the Young Organist's Initiative, the organ library, lectures and workshops, and festivals of organ/choral music, especially for young people.

John Russell is Professor of Music Emeritus at The College of Wooster in Wooster, Ohio. He received his undergraduate training at the Oberlin College Conservatory of Music as an organ major, studying with Haskell Thomson. While at Oberlin, he sang with the Oberlin College Choir and studied choral conducting with Robert Fountain. He completed graduate studies at Boston University where he held a fellowship in choral conducting. As Music Director and Conductor of The Wooster Chorus, Mr. Russell made 29 annual concert tours throughout the United States, from New England to California and the Pacific Northwest. A long time member of the Cleveland Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, he has frequently served as an adjudicator for AGO competitions in organ performance both at the chapter and regional levels. He has been a faculty member of Pipe Organ Encounters in Cleveland, Charleston, West Virginia, and at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester. His strong advocacy for greater incorporation of students and young organists into the AGO most recently took the form of lobbying the national leadership in behalf of increased financial support for the Rising Stars who perform at the National Conventions of the Guild. An active church musician, Mr. Russell served for twenty-five years as Organist and Director of Music at First Presbyterian Church in Wooster, Ohio and, more recently, from 2000 through 2008, he served in a similar capacity at St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Lakewood, Ohio. Mr. Russell and his spouse, The Reverend Susan Russell, live in Marblehead, Massachusetts, where Susan is Priestin-Charge at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church.

Nadia Stevens received her B.A. in Music from Oberlin College, Oberlin, Ohio, where she studied piano and organ. She later studied French in Paris, France; earned the M.A. in Romance Languages from Case Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio; and taught college French for several years. Recently, in May 2008, she received a Diploma in Organ Performance at the Longy School of Music, Cambridge, MA, where she was a student of Peter Sykes. Over the past ten years, she served as organist/choir director at First Parish, Malden, MA, and St. Augustine and St. Martin's Episcopal Church, Roxbury, MA.

Ms. Stevens considers the Chapter's educational efforts, such as the Young Organists Initiative, to be extremely important as well as the fellowship it offers to colleagues. She hopes the Guild can also develop an outreach of organ music to young children.

Nancy Spinka Timmerman is the Organist/Choir Director at the Presbyterian Church in Burlington (since November, 2003). She has been a member of the American Guild of Organists, Boston Chapter since Fall, 2006, and received the AGO's Service Playing Certificate in July, 2007. She gave an (unofficial) Organ Spectacular concert on October 19, 2008, to raise funds for the organ in Burlington. Starting as a pianist in Chicago at the age of five, Nancy Spinka was later a finalist in the Society of American Musicians Senior Piano Contest (William Browning, American Conservatory of Music, teacher) and a student of Chopin Competition winner Gui Mombaerts at Northwestern University. In Boston, she worked with John Oliver at MIT, was a summer student at the New England Conservatory, and has directed and/or accompanied musicals, Gilbert & Sullivan, and opera. She has sung in, accompanied, and/ or directed children's and adult choirs throughout her life. Locally, she has also been involved with the Newton Presbyterian Church and the Fourth Presbyterian Church in South Boston. She has only been a church organist about ten years. In addition to her church duties, Ms. Timmerman is a registered Professional Engineer and has her own private consulting practice in acoustics and noise control. As the economic climate continues to weaken, Nancy thinks the Boston Chapter of the AGO needs to acknowledge this and seek to provide value to the members and the organizations they serve, and to grow its member base.

Requiescat in Pace

Chapter member Russell Lovell, 61, of Pepperell, formerly of Whitman and Florida passed away on February 24.

Born in Stoughton, he was raised in Whitman and was a graduate of Whitman-Hanson Regional High School Class of 1965. He attended Berklee School of Music and later entered the U.S. Army, serving during the Vietnam conflict.

A freelance organist, he played at numerous churches in the Pepperell area and substituted at many others elsewhere.

Russ enjoyed cooking, traveling, researching ancestry, and was an avid reader who enjoyed cats. He is survived by two daughters, two sisters, a brother, and five nieces and nephews.
