April Chapter Program

Make the Hymnbook your Own:

An address by The Reverend Professor Peter J. Gomes Tuesday, April 20, 7:30 p.m. The Memorial Church, Harvard Yard Harvard University

There is no charge for this event. The public is invited.

The Reverend Professor Peter Gomes is Plummer Professor of Christian Morals and Pusey Minister in The Memorial Church at Harvard University. This eminent professor and preacher has long been associated with the AGO and has served as our national chaplain and preacher at two Boston national AGO conventions. Prof. Gomes is a hymn lover, author, composer and hymnologist. We have asked him to include some of his own hymns in his presentation, the title of which comes from one of his sermons.

Rev. Prof. Gomes speaks often about hymns in his sermons. You can listen online to his sermon titled *Hymns and Our Worship* (stream), preached on Sunday October 21, 2007. Go to The Memorial Church website, click on "Media & Publications" and choose "Listen to sermons." The occasion for this sermon was the dedication of *The Harvard University Hymn Book: 4th Edition*. Following are some excerpts.

On the text "I will sing with the spirit, and I will sing with the understanding also," Prof. Gomes said "Words and music are meant to go together. One is **not** superior to the other. Both are meant to communicate with the listener...."Singing is meant to edify in our enterprise; it is meant to be another means of grace. It is meant to instruct, and to move us.

"A hymn is the most valuable piece of equipment for the believer. When I go home on Sunday whether it's gone well here or not, what I usually do after lunch is I sit down and I play through the [hymn]book. It gives me joy, pleasure and satisfaction." In a published interview with The Rev. Daniel Smith (*The Hard Stuff Is the Good News*) Prof. Gomes said:

"She [an older parishioner] recognizes the hymns but the young people do not, though they might be curious about them, these neat little formulas of the faith. If you've grown up on nothing but praise choruses and sentence fragments, and a good Victorian hymn represents a complex theology, you might be interested. My job is to reacquaint a lot of people with what I regard as a lost treasure of the church, its hymnody.

"Many of the hymns are filled with visions that most of us have given up. What I'd like to do is capture some of that energy. We give the Victorians a very hard time for their hypocrisy and their mercantilism and all that sort of stuff, but we've never been able to match their spiritual vocabulary.

"Some of the newer hymns have lost the thrust of the good news. To lose poetry and to lose magic, to lose mystery is in my opinion to lose meaning. I want to recover some of that magic and mystery, and do whatever is in my power to do that."

<u>Clearly ours is a marvelous opportunity to hear Prof. Gomes</u> in a memorable address on April 20. Consider inviting your choir, music committees and the clergy. This program was conceived by the Organ Library Committee, and we are grateful to The Memorial Church and Christian Lane for hosting this event. Repeat or Abandon?

Although most of the busiest musical seasons are winding down and musicians are looking forward to lighter schedules and summer conferences and workshops, it's not over yet! This is a perfect time to think about what worked and what didn't - and why. There are many factors to consider in choosing music, and just as many in deciding whether to use it again, put it on the back shelf for a time, or delete it entirely from your programming. Listen carefully to feedback you receive from your choir, congregation, and clergy to see what common threads appear. The anthem you heard at last summer's convention, sung splendidly by a professional choir, simply may not work in your building. Did the pick-up children's choir sing so well that this could become a regular singing group? Did you discover some new instrumentalists in your congregation who could add to the richness of the music? Does that old, familiar music need a rest while introducing some new texts or settings? Your options are much wider than "repeat or abandon," and the coming of spring is an excellent time to explore these possibilities!

New Organ in Worcester

St. Michael's-on-the-Heights Episcopal Church, Worcester, has a new organ! After this church was rebuilt following the 1953 Worcester tornado, the Morgan family of Worcester graciously donated its 1928 E. M. Skinner unit residence organ to the church. The organ had its console rebuilt and, over the years, some stops were added to make it more usable in a church service, but it remained a unit organ. The old organ could have been saved. However, the organ's wiring, much still from the 1928 instrument, needed replacement; the console needed rebuilding; the old chests needed re-leathering, but it still would have been a unit organ.

While St. Michael's Organ Committee contacted builders to determine the feasibility of a rebuild, the former St. John's Episcopal Church closed; the Committee wrote a rationale to the Legacy Committee of the Episcopal Diocese of Western Massachusetts to acquire the 1974 Casavant organ, which had served St. John's. It then contacted builders for bids and proposals, and Southfield Organ Builders, Inc., of Springfield, MA, presented the best package. Thanks to the Legacy Committee, we were chosen to receive St. John's Casavant organ. David Melrose, President of Southfield Organ Builders, and his crew removed the old Skinner residence organ, rebuilt and reconfigured the Casavant organ to fit the original casework. All of the pipework was regulated to customize it to its new home. A new façade was constructed, using some of the organ's Great Principal 8' pipes in the center of the case. The rebuilt organ has two manuals with eighteen stops, electro-pneumatic stop and key action, solid-state combination action with twelve memory levels and also has a MIDI playback system. James Moore is the Organist/Choirmaster of St. Michael's. Pat Condon serves as chair of the Organ Committee. The Rev. Warren Frederick is the Rector of the church.

The formal dedicatory recital will be held on May at 5 pm with Mark Dwyer, recitalist and Organist/Choirmaster of The Church of the Advent, Boston.
