Indiana University professor **Jeffrey Smith** will lead a masterclass using the Schoenstein organ. He wants to demystify improvisation and remove the fear factor, while focusing on very practical things for all organists: hymn introductions, modulations, bridges, etc. (In conjunction with his improvisation recital on poetry of George Herbert at Church of the Advent, 30 Brimmer Street, Boston, April 8, Friday)

Jeffrey Smith is Visiting Associate Professor of Church Music and Organ at Indiana University Jacobs School of Music. He has served as Canon Director of Music at Grace Cathedral, San Francisco, and Music Director of Saint Paul's K Street, Washington, DC. Dr. Smith is a graduate of Yale University, Northwestern University, and the Royal College of Music, London. He is a Fellow of the AGO and the Royal School of Church Music. He studied improvisation with Gerre Hancock and Philippe Lefebvre.

Biographies for Chapter Election Candidates

Membership Secretary: Tim Hughes (2nd Term)

Timothy Hughes (Incumbent) has held positions at Park St. Church, Boston, and St. Paul Roman Catholic Church, Cambridge, and is currently a freelance organist. His undergraduate studies were at Gordon College and U Mass. Amherst, and he earned his M.S.M. at Boston University and M.L.S. from Simmons College. He has previously served the Boston Chapter as Placement Services Coordinator.

Treasurer: Joel Davidson (1st Term)

Joel Davidson, a self-employed attorney and Quincy native, specializes in social security disability, real estate and probate and serves as church organist at St. Brendan in Dorchester. At Milton Academy, Joel received the A. Howard Abell Award for Instrumental Music. Joel studied Music and English Literature at Harvard College and was a Piano Student in the Extension Division at the New England Conservatory of Music while at Harvard. Joel began playing the organ while at Oxford University when a group of American students asked him to play a service on the organ at the Trinity College Chapel. Joel studies organ with Allen Thomas and pursues a certificate in Jewish liturgical music from Hebrew College. Joel served as 2009 BAGO Regional Convention Treasurer and currently serves as BAGO Assistant Treasurer. He looks forward to the challenge of serving as BAGO Treasurer.

Recording Secretary: Nancy Timmerman (2nd Term)

Nancy Spinka Timmerman is the Organist/Choir Director at the Presbyterian Church in Burlington (since 2003), where she gave concerts in 2008 and 2009 to raise funds for the organ there. She has been a member of the American Guild of Organists, Boston Chapter (BAGO) since Fall, 2006, and received the AGO's Service Playing Certificate in July, 2007. She is currently Recording Secretary for BAGO and was a volunteer during the 2009 Regional Convention. Trained as a pianist, she was a finalist in Chicago's Society of American Musicians Senior Piano Contest. She has also studied piano at Northwestern University and New England Conservatory. She worked with John Oliver at MIT, and has directed and/or accompanied musicals, Gilbert & Sullivan, and opera. She has sung in, accompanied, and/or directed children's and adult choirs throughout her life. Ms. Timmerman also has a private consulting engineering practice in acoustics and noise control.

Registrar: Mark Slawson (2nd Term)

Mark Slawson received a Bachelor's degree in composition from Union College and a Master's degree in harpsichord from New England Conservatory. He has performed with Cantorum Baroque Ensemble, Boston Renaissance Ensemble, La Sonnerie de St. Bôtolphe and Ensemble Suave, among other chamber ensembles. He has been organist and music director at Second Parish, Hingham, Unitarian Universalist, since 1989. Mark is on the board of trustees of the Cambridge Society for Early Music and the Society for Historically Informed Performance. He has 24 years' experience as assistant registrar at Harvard Law School, and is currently registrar at Cambridge College.

Auditor: Terry Halco (2nd Term)

Terry Halco is active as an organist, choir director, accompanist and singer. Originally from Ohio, he received his musical training at Baldwin-Wallace College, Berea, Ohio, and the New England Conservatory. Mr. Halco is currently the interim Music Director at Harvard-Epworth Church in Cambridge, and has served as music director for Episcopal, Lutheran, Presbyterian, and UCC churches in the Boston area. He is the accompanist for the choruses Musica Sacra, Chorus pro Musica, and the choruses at U. Mass. Boston. He is also one of the staff accompanists at the Boston Conservatory. He has been the accompanist for the Emerson College Chorale and the Simmons College Chorale, and has performed with the Tanglewood Festival Chorus and the vocal ensemble Capella Alamire.

Auditor: Claire DeCusati (1st Term)

I have been a member of the BAGO for several years, although only after my recent retirement from IBM have I had time to volunteer for Chapter activities. My qualifications for auditor include experience in managing budgets and forecasting income and expenses. With IBM, I successfully managed a \$16M budget each year for 5 years. I also have auditing experience, successfully completing a corporate project for my international project. Since retirement, my volunteer experience includes: Steering Committee membership for the AGO 2014 National Convention; Membership on the AGO's Task Force on New Technology; Leadership team for the Project Management Institute's Ethics Community; and Community Garden Club of Duxbury Board Membership as Corresponding Secretary. I would bring project management organizational skills and personal enthusiasm to the BAGO Auditor position, and would be honored to serve in this capacity.

Auditor: Daryl Bichel (1st Term)

Daryl Bichel has served as organist and choirmaster at Lutheran and Episcopal parishes in the Boston area, and at the Society of St. John the Evangelist in Cambridge. He is currently a member of the choir of men and boys at All Saints - Ashmont in Dorchester. In a previous era he served as membership secretary of the Boston AGO and on the Board of the Old West Organ Society. In addition to singing with The Seraphim Singers, he manages a concert series offered at his home in Jamaica Plain and a unique weekly compline liturgy called Night Song, held at St. John's Episcopal Church in Jamaica Plain.

Assistant Treasurer: Douglas Witte

Douglas Witte received his undergraduate training in organ and Early Music performance at the Longy School of Music, and his graduate level training in organ performance at the Sweelinck Conservatory in Amsterdam, followed by a period of independent study in Ost-Friesland under the auspices of the North German Organ Academy. Since returning to the United States in 1993 he has held the post of Organist and Choir director at St. John's Episcopal Church in Charlestown. In 2000 he became a managing associate at Gadgets, a boutique kitchenware retailer in Jamaica Plain, where he was responsible for all aspects of operating a small business. When asked if he would consider running for assistant treasurer he instantly agreed, having long felt it was overdue that he become more active in support of his guild.

Member-at-large: Bryan Ashley

Bryan Ashley obtained his Bachelor's and Master of Music degrees in organ performance in the USA, a *Prix d'Excellence* from France, and a *Solisten Diplom* from Germany. He was a finalist two years in a row in the Fort Wayne National Organ Playing Competition and was the winner of the First International Organ Competition, Musashino-Tokyo, Japan. Throughout his career he has been active as a recitalist, a church musician, and a university teacher, including four years as an organ instructor at the

Tokyo National University of Fine Arts and Music. During his 16-year residence in Japan, he concertized extensively throughout the country, giving recitals in major concert halls, universities, and churches. He has performed with several well-known Japanese orchestras and has been featured on national radio and television. He has been serving as Organist of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston since February 2009.

Member-at-large: Christine Hogan

Christine Hogan is an organist and pianist from Sudbury, Massachusetts where she lives with her husband and five children ages 1.5 to 13. She attended Tanglewood several years, graduated high school from North Carolina School for the Arts and received her Bachelors from Boston University Collaborative Piano and her Masters of Sacred Music from Boston University School of Theology where she studied organ with Julian Wachner and conducting with Ann Howard Jones. Christine has been Music Director and Organist at Boston area churches including the Church of All Nations, Catholic Center at Boston University at Marsh Chapel during her undergraduate and graduate studies, Sacred Heart Parish in Lexington, Fisk Memorial United Methodist Church in Natick, and currently Plymouth Congregational Church in Belmont. She is familiar with a wide repertoire of music including traditional and contemporary and is passionate about bringing the joys of organ and church music to all ages.

Member-at-large: Harry Huff:

Harry Lyn Huff is Minister of Music at Boston's historic Old South Church (UCC), where he plays the 1921 E.M. Skinner organ, op. 308 of 115 ranks, conducts the Old South Choir and supervises the church's extensive music program, which includes a jazz ministry, the Old South Ringers and numerous concerts. He is currently also Music Director and Lecturer on Ministry at the Harvard Divinity School and Chapter Organist in The Memorial Church, Harvard University. From 1984 until 2004 he was Director of Music for Calvary Episcopal Church, and from 1986 until 2004 he was Organist and Artist-in-Residence at Union Theological Seminary, both in New York City. His other New York positions have included Adjunct Organist in St. Paul's Chapel, Columbia University, Organist of Temple Shaaray Tefila, Director of Choral Activities at the Aaron Copland School of Music, Queens College, CUNY and Artistic Director for the St. George's Choral Society.

Member-at-large: Brandon Santini:

Having been a member of the Boston Chapter since I was 11 years old (I believe I was told the youngest ever at that point), I am excited to be nominated for the executive committee. I am also excited to be living in the Boston area again after pursuing study at the Oberlin Conservatory and subsequently the Eastman School of Music. We have a vibrant chapter with many great opportunities, and I hope to see that grow. Currently, I serve as Director of Music at Holy Trinity Lutheran in Easton, MA where I have the privilege of playing a well-kept 1859 Hook, which has quite the provenance. I am also serving on the steering committee for the upcoming POE Advanced/Technical this summer here in the city. I hope to work with many of you and meet many more of you in the years to come.

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Cathedral Encores: CD Review

Framing the rose window of Holy Cross Cathedral and spanning the width of its immense Gothic nave, the monumental Hook & Hastings organ – believed to be the oldest in any North American cathedral – stands as one of Boston's musical treasures. From the day of its dedication in 1875 to the present, it has not only supported liturgy and choral song, but has also regularly sounded forth in recitals given by both international and local organists. In recent years, these have been faithfully recorded by Scott Kent, and from this archive Cathedral Organist Leo Abbott has selected a bouquet of organ solos demonstrating the organ's versatility, played by ten distinguished Boston recitalists over a 20-year period.

Brilliantly opening the set is the *Allegro* from Widor's *Symphonie VI*, played by the late Nina Bergeron with flawless timing and a never flagging sense of forward motion that flows effortlessly through the work's various transitions to its resounding conclusion. Showing that the organ is also capable of handling the French Baroque, Lois Regestein's cleanly registered and crisply articulated *Offertoire* from Couperin's Mass for the Convents offers an interesting contrast. Rounding out a trio of French works is Jeanne Joulain's *Final: Ave Maris Stella*, in which Rodger Vine launches its veritable tonal fireworks with drive and panache, and proves that Mme. Joulain is a composer to whom more attention ought to be paid.

The organ's Germanic voice is next heard in two works. Margaret Angelini begins Mendelssohn's Prelude and Fugue in d minor with a meaty pleno, yet brings out the contrapuntal lines convincingly, and the more foundational fugue that follows unfolds effortlessly. In contrast, Brian Jones's performance of Karg-Elert's Pax Vobiscum gives us the first real taste of the organ's quieter aspect, opening suavely with string and flute stops, but building seamlessly up to a strong *forte* conclusion. More of the organ's lighter side is heard in Leo Abbott's seemingly effortless spinning of the delicate threads of Dupré's virtuosic Fileuse. Following this, Rosalind Mohnsen turns on the fireworks again with verve in the first part of Saint-Saëns's Prelude and Fugue in C major before cleanly bringing the intricate fugue to its brilliant ending. Scandinavian composer Niels Gade provides a more lyrical type of counterpoint in his Tone Poem, fittingly interpreted with smoothly sculpted phrasing and a somewhat lighter registration by Mark Dwyer.

Closing the disc is a new work by Richard Clark and an improvisation by Peter Krasinski. Clark's *Unity*, for organ and clarinet (played by Kara Gretschel Clark), balances the two instruments nicely, opening with interplay between a single flute stop and the clarinet. Some foundational chords in the middle alternate briefly with clarinet solos, and interplay resumes as both instruments fade to a quiet conclusion. Prize-winning improviser Krasinski unleashes full organ at the beginning of his improvisation, but soon begins exploring quieter nooks and crannies of the organ's tonal resources with stringy interludes and varied solo stops, eventually working back to a splashy ending via some impressive pedal work.

This reviewer is always impressed by the way different players express their "take" on a fine organ, especially one of this size, each seeming to see or favor different facets not only of its tonal resources but even of its acoustical surroundings. The examples chosen for this recording truly exemplify this – as well as showcasing the talent of some of Boston's outstanding organ recitalists. You will not find a better "sampler" of Bostonian organ virtuosity anywhere.
