## Dean's Message

Since I am a January baby, I am occasionally reminded of the namesake of my month, the Greek god Janus. This mythical deity of both beginnings and endings has one face that looks back at the past, and one that looks forward to the future. At this centenary point in the common endeavor that we call the Boston Chapter, AGO, we have much to see in either direction.

In a previous edition of the newsletter, our Regional Councilor Lois Toeppner submitted an article that summed up the many accomplishments of our chapter. As I review that article, I am amazed at how many firsts came from the Boston Chapter. From the very beginning we offered events and public church services to the region - for in those days we were the New England chapter and had a lot of region to cover! We have been concerned with getting every organist in the area to join the guild since the 1920's, a time when it was more difficult to gain admission to any organization. As early as the 1930's we were addressing issues of employment and professional development, a concern that eventually led to the Dean Steinmetz producing the Boston Chapter's "Work and Compensation," our own little "Green Book." We have invented ways to find new young organists with our YOI scholarships, and we also keep and share our past in the Organ Library. We were even the first to produce a chapter newsletter - we have Dean Marier to thank for the missive you are reading right now! All of these accomplishments are due to the commitment that our predecessors had to the chapter, to the profession, and to each other.

That commitment, I am happy to report, is still going strong, and it is manifested in every one of you that gives of your time and talent to the guild. You bring your gifts of musical talent, generosity, and good humor, and make this chapter the powerful force for organ and choral music that it is. In particular, this centennial celebration would not have been anywhere near as successful without the Herculean efforts of the officers and committee members of this chapter. I know I will forget someone if I start mentioning names, so please forgive me for not doing so! All of you have worked tirelessly for the chapter – thank you.

Most importantly, it is time to look forward. There is plenty yet to do! Our little Green Book needs serious updating, as salaries for our profession continue to

## Organ Library News

### January Organ Library Event

On Tuesday, January 10, 2006, the Organ Library of the Boston Chapter will sponsor a lecture-recital by the Italian organist, composer and editor, Angelo Castaldo. Maestro Castaldo has concertized widely on several continents, and before his appearance in Boston he will have played the New Year's recital at the National Cathedral in Washington. The subject of his presentation will be "Italian Organ Music of the Nineteenth and Early Twentieth Century: From Opera House to Symphonic Style." More information will appear in the January Newsletter about this event, which will be followed by a reception in Maestro Castaldo's honor at the Organ Library. Please plan to come. Since Boston University is not in session, parking will not be a problem.

### The Organ Library: Giving and Receiving

In order to make space for file cabinets needed to house its ever expanding collection, the Organ Library is disposing of two tall bookcases, each about three feet wide. Chapter members or their churches may have these without charge, simply by arranging to have them removed. A reminder: besides giving things away, the Organ Library is always interested in receiving donations or organ music. Items not present in the permanent collection are most desirable, of course, but this past year the sale of duplicate copies has been a significant source of income for the Library. ## Special Meeting of the Chapter to Vote on a Change in Operating Procedures

The following changes to the Operating Procedures have been recommended by the treasurer and are supported by the Executive Committee.

### ARTICLE IV: OFFICERS

Section 1. The Officers of the Chapter shall consist of a Dean, Sub-Dean, Recording Secretary, Membership Secretary, Treasurer, <u>Assistant Treasurer</u>, Registrar, Chaplain, if appointed, and two Auditors . . . .

### Paragraph 2

The Membership Secretary and the Treasurer shall be elected in odd-numbered years and shall hold office for a two-year term, or until their successors are duly elected. It is recommended that they serve no more than two (2) consecutive terms. The Assistant Treasurer shall be elected in even-numbered years, and shall hold office for a two-year term, or until the successor is duly elected. It is recommended that s/he serve no more than two (2) consecutive terms.

(e) The Treasurer shall keep, or cause to be kept, an accurate and detailed set of books relative to the financial standing of the regular and invested funds of the Chapter, presenting such reports at all meetings of the Executive Committee and the Annual Meeting of the Chapter. <u>The Treasurer shall</u> <u>prepare, or cause to be prepared, all Federal and State tax forms (form 990) and the filings for the Office of the Attorney General of Massachusetts (form PC) to keep the Chapter in compliance with Federal and State non-profit regulations. The Treasurer shall pay only those bills deemed appropriate by the Executive Committee and the Finance Committee.</u>

(f) The Assistant Treasurer shall assist the Treasurer in the performance of his duties. Suggested duties include paying bills, making deposits, becoming familiar with the bookkeeping system, and performing other financial duties as mutually agreed upon with the treasurer.

### ARTICLE V: THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

(c) Finance Committee. The Finance Committee shall consist of at least the Dean, Treasurer, <u>Assistant</u> <u>Treasurer</u>, and the two Auditors . . .

These changes to the operating procedures will be voted on by the members in a special meeting of the chapter, which shall be held on Tuesday, January 10, 2006 at 7:15pm at Marsh Chapel, Boston University, directly before the lecture-recital event sponsored by the Organ Library.

## Executive Committee Minutes of Meeting Sept. 18, 2005

The meeting was called to order at 7:08 in the choir room of St. Stephen's Church, Cohasset. Present were Margaret Angelini, Frederick Guzasky, Sally Slade Warner, Heinrich Christiansen, Lee Ridgway, Andrew Shenton, Stephanie Budwey, David Harris, Cheryl Duerr, Joan Reddy, Charlene Higbe, Maureen Connolly, Douglas Major, Barbara Owen.

- 1. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved, with one correction: the membership drive mentioned by Lois Toeppner is a national one, and details will be provided later.
- 2. Treasurer's report was circulated and reviewed by the Dean. Because the chapter's budget, combined with that of the Organ Library, exceeds \$100,000, the IRS has requested a financial audit, the expense of which will be partly paid for by the Library. A question was asked about the "Education Fund," which is largely for the YOI. The cost of the yearbook is under budget this year, but still more than income from ads, etc. MOTION to approve passed unanimously.
- 3. Membership secretary reports that we currently stand at about 500 members. Rob Humphreville will call non-renewers.
- 4. No report from Registrar, but the Dean asked for someone to write up the first chapter meeting for TAO and Cheryl Duerr volunteered.
- 5. The Dean attended a Dean's retreat and learned about the "each one reach one" membership drive being planned by headquarters. She noted that people had been asking how to help AGO members affected by the hurricane and flood in New Orleans and Louisiana, and said that there was a posting on <u>www.agohq.org</u>.
- 6. a. Nothing new to report.
  - b. No report

- c. The Library is looking to assess space problems. Monetary donations welcome.
- d. Fred Guzasky has been appointed membership growth chair and will get info on the national membership drive. It was noted that demographically, BAGO is a very spread-out chapter, and has many dual members.
- e. Nothing new on Newsletter.
- f. Nominating will report at a subsequent meeting.
- g. Placement committee is working on providing a worksheet for churches and applicants to help assess actual work hours for a given position. A new column for weddings and funerals was suggested. Martin has produced 100 updated "Green Books," 50 for BAGO and 50 for headquarters.
- h. A handout was circulated for action and discussion by the PDC. The fact that we are an educational organization was emphasized, and the PDC has done a search of other chapters' websites to get an idea of what other chapters were doing in the area of substitute placement. The PDC recommended that substitutes (who must be voting members) be listed on the chapter website, and that an outline of information for both substitutes and churches be provided. PDC recommended that the certification requirement not be included in BAGO substitute listing policy and a self-evaluation form be used instead. MOTION made, discussed and carried to accept recommendations of PDC. A second MOTION was made and carried requesting the PDC to prepare a draft of the selfevaluation form before the next meeting.
- i. Flyers were handed out for the choir concert at Trinity Church, and the need to sell lots of tickets was stressed.
- j. No SPAC activity
  - this year's budget has already been spent.
- k. Substitute matters discussed under PDC.
- l. No Yearbook report.
- m. No YOI report.
- 7. Discussion of recommendation to add an Assistant Treasurer, with specific duties, to the list of officers. This will require a Bylaws change, which must be voted on at an open meeting of the members. E-mail ballot approval was suggested, but there is no provision for this in the Bylaws. In order to get the new officer on the ballot, this Bylaws change must thus be approved at a meeting before February.

Meeting adjourned at 8:20. The next meeting will be Nov. 14 at King's Chapel House.

## Review - Westminster Abbey Choir at Trinity Church

A generous crowd of nearly 1000 people filled Trinity Church on Sunday, October 16 to hear James O'Donnell and his famous English choir. The excellent planning of many Boston Chapter members ensured a fine turnout, and all were in for a beautiful afternoon of music covering a wide range of styles and dates.

Mr. O'Donnell was well-known for his work at Westminster Cathedral before being appointed the first Roman Catholic choirmaster at the Abbey, and he has made as smooth a transition musically as he must have done geographically (several blocks). Nothing about the choir's performance betrayed any evidence that Boston was the first stop on their American tour, and although they sing an enormous quantity of music from week to week, the scope of this program could have challenged any fine choir.

Leading off with Britten's *C Major Te Deum*, an air of command and assurance was immediately established. Robert Quinney was the alert and musical accompanist, and if balance was occasionally off, the vagaries of the Trinity organ are enough to challenge any newcomer: to his credit, Quinney did not shy away from using both Nave and Chancel organs, which greatly enhances the sense of filling the room with sound. If there was a certain objective quality to the Britten and then the Byrd *Benedictus* from the Great Service, it may have been the only evidence that the group was acclimating itself to Trinity's somewhat tricky acoustic.

Quinney's reading of the Bach Fantasia and Fugue in G minor was outstanding musically, at the same time suffering from odd choices of ensemble in the Plenum called for in this piece: this listener spent most of the Fantasia guessing just what registrations had, and had not, been used in the nave and chancel organs-an odd mix of fundamental and mixtures, together with a predominant 8' reed in the pedal. As fine an interpretation of the fugue as he offered would be difficult to imagine, but he chose to play nearly all of it on the chancel organ alone, and on the more remote Great/ Choir; listening from the Nave, one wonders if those divisions are in the Public Garden! When Quinney later performed the Walton Coronation March-Orb and Sceptre, he seemed to have "sussed out" (as the English are fond of saying) the organ: his playing and registration were brilliant at every turn.

The Choir then returned for the highlight of the afternoon: the Frances Grier *Kyrie and Gloria from the Missa Trinitatis Sanctae*. Grier's mystical harmony and texture asks nothing less than total commitment, and the forces could not have sung it more compellingly. It was fascinating to wonder how many parts were singing at any given time in the extensive use of divisi, complex rhythms and harmony, and broad texture of this work. Philip Moore's intriguing setting of Andrew Notion's *The King and the Robin*, another exceedingly difficult score, was again sung as ideally as one might hope, as were the Purcell's *Funeral Sentences* (the less familiar setting).

One might have wished for a stronger tenor solo in Gibbons' *See, the Word is Incarnate*, but the Choir again was singing stylistically and with great character, as was the case in the same composer's *Hosanna to the Son of David.*" Byrd's *O Lord, make thy servant Elizabeth*, is rarely heard and welcome here.

The program concluded with Howells' *Behold*, *O God our Defender*, and a rare performance of the Walton *Coronation Te Deum*, betraying no hint at all of jet lag or fatigue in a program already approaching two hours' duration. If the balance between choir and organ was occasionally a bit off the mark, one could easily admire the command and panache that all performers brought to this sturdy, demanding work.

A richly-deserved standing ovation led to a brief and appropriate encore, Vaughan Williams motet *O Taste and See*, written for Queen Elizabeth's coronation at the Abbey in 1953 — a fine choice after the concluding Walton, and one that left an audience grateful for a brilliant afternoon of world-class choral singing. Indeed, there will "always be an England" as long as choirs of this stature make music on this level. Perhaps the sound has less flint and steel in it than did O'Donnell's group at Westminster Cathedral. But here is a sound that works first and foremost for the Abbey — indeed for any space in which one is lucky enough to hear this magnificent ensemble.
