Join the Happy New Year chorus at our annual BAGO organ recital on New Year's Eve. Three AGO members will share in this program, playing 20 minutes each. Here is a brief bio for each of our fine recitalists.

Brink Bush is Organist and Director of Music of the Cathedral of St. John, Providence, RI, and is a leading interpreter of German Romantic organ music in the world today. He has performed throughout the United States and Germany, having made his German debut at the Berlin Cathedral in August 2001. He was featured in a National Public Radio *Pipedreams* program entitled "Bach, Bush and Middelschulte" aired September 2005. [You will enjoy listening to this fascinating program on the PIPEDREAMS website.] In October 2005, Brink presented a concert at Trinity Church, Wall St., NYC, for the "Virgil Fox Legacy, Twenty-fifth Anniversary Concert Weekend."

G. Fredrick Guzasky has performed recitals in New England and the Midwest, as well as Russia, Latvia, and England, receiving the Boston University Outstanding Performance Award and the EMACT Award in conducting. He has played at the Cathedral of Riga, the Kapella Concert Hall in St. Petersburg, Russia, and has taught master classes at the St. Petersburg Conservatory. He is an authority on Gregorian Chant and is director of the Slava Chorale, a Boston based professional choir that performs Russian and Greek music. He also has done extensive research on the organ works of Josef Rheinberger. Recently Fred published his first mystery novel.

Lois Toeppner has served in numerous AGO offices for the Boston and Worcester chapters and for Region I. Last summer she was elected Secretary of the National Council. Lois is Minister of Music at St. John Evangelical Lutheran Church, Sudbury, where she serves as organist and directs the vocal and handbell choirs. She has played recitals at Methuen Memorial Music Hall, Worcester's Mechanics Hall, Boston's Old South Church and area churches throughout the New England states. Her recital pieces for First Night are:

Organ Sonata No. 4 in B flat major, Op. 65 - Felix Mendelssohn

New Era (a march for Manchester Town Hall) - Nigel Ogden

The Arlington St. Church organ is a 1957 Aeolian-Skinner, housed in a magnificent case original to the E. and G.G. Hook organ of 1861. The Hook case pipes still provide the organ's foundation sound. The organ's specifications and history can be read at www.ascboston.org/music.

This will be the 33rd First Night Boston. Founded in 1976, First Night was started by artists who sought an alternative to traditional New Year's Eve revelry. First Night has gone from attracting about 25,000 people to drawing crowds over one million. Our Chapter program is an organ recital that will be well attended!

First Night buttons are \$18 (children under 4 admitted free) and will be available beginning Nov. 28 at Boston-area Shaw's and Star Markets, Store 24, Au Bon Pain, and dozens of other locations. 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Dean's Message

Dare we hope?

Here we are in Advent: that time of expectation and hopefulness. A time when our meditations should be preparing us for the coming of Jesus. For we who are church musicians, however, Advent and its meaning probably get short shrift.

For us, the run-up to Christmas can be several weeks of intense and sometimes frantic preparation and rehearsals. Plus the anxiety over whether or not the music for those lessons and carols, candlelight services, music Sundays, concerts, pageants, whatever else, and finally Christmas Eve itself, will actually come off as we would hope. This, on top of the other things we probably need to do, such as shop for gifts, decorate the house, go to parties or concerts or *The Nutcracker* or other "holiday" events, cook, and otherwise "get into the spirit"! Nevermind the commercialization, secularization, and Muzak. Our hope is only to survive it all.

How tempting to just say "Bah! Humbug!"

But then, as Advent becomes Christmas...

A lone, small voice intones "Once in David's royal city..."

A congregation, glowing in candlelight, softly sings "Silent night, holy night..." A children's choir sings perfectly "Jesus, Jesus rest your head..."

Often, it is the simplest of musical gestures which will focus our minds on why we are bothering with this thing called Advent and Christmas at all: the humble birth of a child whose premise is that of hope for the whole world.

During this hectic month, set aside a few quiet moments each day to contemplate the hopefulness of Advent, which becomes fulfilled in the Christmas message. Dare to hope:

- -that we will have it in our hearts and deeds to help the poor, the homeless, the hungry, and those in desperate circumstances beyond their control;
- -that we may comfort the lonely and the unloved, the aged and the children;
- -that we can bring relief to the unemployed, the oppressed, and the downtrodden;
- -that compassion, fairness, equity, and justice will be in the hearts and minds of those who govern;
- -that there will, indeed, be peace, health, and safety for all people of the earth.

An Enlightening Evening

Larry Palmer's Distler Presentation Our Chapter Program on Nov. 3

Dr. Larry Palmer's illustrated lecture on Hugo Distler, his life and music, was a mind and heart opening experience. More than 40 people gathered in Appleton Chapel (the Choir/Organ area) of Memorial Church, Harvard Univ., a fitting place for our quest to know more about this talented composer organist who lived a life of triumph and tragedy. Dr. Palmer gave us extraordinary information about Distler and his contemporaries and spoke from a point of deep understanding of his subject. We listened to a rapturous and elegant performance of Distler's partita on "Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland", played on the great Fisk organ by Christa Rakich. Also we listened to performances of Distler's beautiful choral music, harpsichord concerto, and even a recording of Distler himself playing a Pachelbel toccata. We all felt renewed by the wish to know more about Hugo Distler.

Thank you, Catherine Chaisson, who assisted with the reception. Thank you, former BAGO dean and Memorial Church staff member, Nancy Granert, who hosted us.

The study of Distler's life involved looking at the politics and war that so affected his life. In some ways the evening was a prelude to our electing a new president the next day.

The memorial tribute will be led by The Rev. Peter Gomes, Pusey Minister of Memorial Church, with the participation of choir alumni, formers assistant organists, colleagues, and friends.

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Review: Bálint Karosi's Recital of Hungarian Organ Music

The newest rising star on the Boston organ scene, Hungarian Bálint Karosi, played an insightful and inspiring concert at St. Cecilia Church in Boston's Back Bay on Friday evening, October 17. There was a good sized audience from the Guild and parishioners from both St. Cecilia and Bálint's church, First Lutheran at the corner of Berkeley and Marlborough Streets. Just this summer, Bálint was the 1st Prize winner of the XVI International Johann Sebastian Bach Competition in Leipzig, Germany. He has studied organ, clarinet and improvisation at the Liszt Academy in Budapest, at the Conservatoire Superieure de Genève and at the Oberlin Conservatory, earning two Master's Degrees, two "Prix de Virtuosité" and both an Artist Diploma and a Master of Music in Historical Performance. Prior to this summer, he also won first prize in several other international organ competitions.

On this Friday in October, Bálint chose a program of all Hungarian organ music from his homeland in observance of the 52nd Anniversary of the Hungarian Revolution. He opened with the Liszt Weinen, Klagen, Zorgen, Zagen. He expertly set the stage for a fascinating evening with this piece of great gravity, which ends so triumphantly with the Lutheran Chorale Was Gott tut ist wohlgetan. This was followed by a rather esoteric piece, Evocation à la Chapelle Sixtine. This fantasia in two sections, the second based on Mozart's Ave Verum, ended in a sort of suspended aura with the audience a bit unsure if that was really the end. The next piece for the evening was an organ transcription by Lionel Rogg of Liszt's Funérailles for piano. The program notes mention that it was inspired by the death of Chopin in 1849 and there are distinct references to Chopinesque themes from the heroic polonaises. The playing here had an appropriate dramatic flair, but always with the utmost refinement and control.

The Scherzo "Sportive Fauns" was composed by the Hungarian organist and composer, Dezsõ Antalffy-Zsiross, who actually worked as theatre organist at the Radio City Music Hall and as organist for the New York Philharmonic during the first half of the 20th century. With this fun and playful piece, the organist elicited beautiful colors from the large Smith & Gilbert/Nobscot organ at St. Cecilia's. The closing piece treated us to a sample of Bálint Karosi's compositional prowess in addition to his formidable technical abilities. He notes that his *Trumpet Toccata* was started in 2006 in Oberlin, but not finished until he was in Boston in 2007. He goes on to say that this piece is "an amalgam of different styles, a French-sounding theme mixed up with some *Minimal Music* elements. Just another

virtuosic piece with a lot of pedal work." This is certainly a modest description from a modest composer/performer, who has actually done an incredible amount for someone not even yet 30 years old! This listener expected to hear a bit more in the way of trumpet solos in this toccata, but found the piece exciting nonetheless.

What was most impressive on this evening was the way in which Bálint demonstrated his impeccable taste in registrations. He always made this organ sound beautiful and refined, which is not always the case with the several other times I've heard it. The sound never once became harsh or rough sounding, yet still produced plenty of excitement. Perhaps the weather helped that, too. All-in-all I came away with quite a satisfied feeling as I went on my way from this fine performance. Now based on what I heard, I am really looking forward to hearing him play some of those Bach pieces he played to win the prestigious Leipzig competition.

Organ Library News

"Preserving the Musical Heritage of the Pipe Organ"

This phrase, developed in the course of preparing the Organ Library's new website www.organlibrary.org, aptly describes the goal of the Library, founded by Boston Chapter members George Faxon, Max Miller, and Lois Toeppner. The Web Catalog of the Library's holdings (now about 37,000 titles) is searchable from anywhere in the world, an opportunity that has brought this unique resource to the notice of organists on many continents. During the last two weeks of October, inquiries were received from England (2), New Zealand, and several states (South Dakota, Florida, Missouri, New York, and Michigan). It is anticipated that even more interest will be generated by an article scheduled to appear in the December issue of *The American Organist* and an advertisement that will run during 2009 in *The Tracker*.

While the Organ Library purchases important new publications (editions of music, facsimiles, books) in order to fill in gaps and expand its collection, it still depends very much on donations of material. "Preserving the musical heritage of the pipe organ" means that the Organ Library intends to make available to coming generations tens of thousands of works composed or transcribed for the organ. Boston Chapter members can take a vital lead, not only by donating items of music but also by informing colleagues across the country about the resources available to them here in Boston.

Musings on EROI 2008

Did You Know:

That a "iula" is a clear and bright flue stop that speaks like a principal, but has some stringy and flutey character too?

That previously unknown works by J.S. Bach and his circle are still being discovered by a systematic search process in central Europe?

That mixtures of Bach's time often had a non-breaking major third rank (1 3/5') so as to cover up the breaks in the octave and fifth ranks, thus making the mixture more capable of polyphony?

That variety and changes of registrational color were highly prized in baroque organ playing?

That German congregation hymn singing in Bach's time was not necessarily accompanied; often very loud and very flat; and most likely ponderously slow?

These and many other discoveries were part of this year's Eastman Rochester Organ Initiative (EROI), which was a tour-de-force of the latest and greatest happenings in the organ world. The conference opened with reminiscences about David Craighead and Russell Saunders, given by Jurgen Thym, Martha Sobaje, Larry Smith, Tandy Reussner, Kerala Snyder, and Mr. Craighead himself. It was especially nice to see at least 4 generations of Eastman Students return to hear the organ that we've been waiting for for about 30 years. We then moved to Christ Church for the inauguration of the Craighead-Saunders Organ. To catch you up, this long-awaited organ is an international collaboration and research project which has replicated (reconstructed using historical methods, materials, and tools) a 1776 organ in the Holy Spirit Church in Vilnius, Lithuania, which is one of the very few surviving central European instruments from this period. The original was built by Adam Casparini (1715-1788) and it is very well suited to the music of J.S. Bach and his circle, and works well with most organ literature through Mendelssohn. (Mendelssohn will be the center of next year's EROI.)

I shall not attempt to review all the lectures and recitals, but shall give you, gentle reader, a few of the highlights which stand out in my mind.

The concerts were fabulous:

• All the 8' stops together - simply gorgeous - I thought Bill Porter could have launched into a Franck Chorale.

- Hans Davidsson & 6 dancers from the Rochester Ballet performing the Bach *Toccata*, *Adagio*, & *Fugue* (twice).
- David Higgs: Mendelssohn a splendid performance proving yet again that he deserves to be the head of the most important organ department in the country.
- The Sinfonia of BWV 29 *Wir danken dir, Gott* by Paul O'Dette and the Boston Early Music Festival Chamber Ensemble, showing how this piece was intended to be played by a large organ rather than some little portable box.
- Bill Porter's improvisations especially the luscious French ones at Compline.
- A lecture by Niclas Fredriksson, Organ Curator for the National Heritage Board, Sweden, showing the relationships among various central European organbuilders in the 17th & 18th century.
- The final concert, especially the playing of Ludger Lohmann, professor of organ at the Conservatory of Music and Performing Arts in Stuttgart, Germany, whose truly elegant and refined touch and musicality were a joy to hear.

And... they even fed us well. The various dinners were held at a couple of private clubs very close to the school or at the convention hotel and were well executed. We had one night of dinner on our own, so I decided to do a restaurant review.

Below the Sibley Music Library there are a bunch of shops and so forth, and a small restaurant called Max. On Saturday night I splurged and ate there. The wine list by the bottle is extensive, and their selection of house wines by the glass very good (though it is not listed in the menu as they rotate it frequently). I started with a seared scallop covered in pork bellies, with a glass of the house Pinot Noir – both were tremendous, the pork bellies were done just right, and the scallop was topped with hair-thin french fried potato.

The chef then sent an appetizer of shrimp and poblano peppers, which was acceptable, though the shrimp had been somewhat overcooked. I switched to the house chardonnay (French, quite nice) for the main course: Sole with cabbage, bacon, and a wine glaze. This was light, very flavorful, and truly enjoyable. It's just amazing what bacon, butter, and the right kind of cooking can do for a rather drab vegetable and a bit of fish. Though I did not have any of them, the beef dishes looked fabulous as well: a tenderloin tartar appetizer and a lovely filet mignon which I saw come to the neighboring table.

I had to wait rather a long time for the dessert menu, but it (continued on page 9)

A Boston Organist Saga

Chapter One

Seated one day at the organ, I thought about the coming Christmas season. No one has requested to sing *O Holy Night* as a solo. I think about the French Noëls and the reports of D'Aquin playing Noël variations in Notre Dame cathedral packed with thousands (really?) of worshippers on Christmas Eve. Now, how could I do that? Thought by thought, person by person even, I begin to imagine filling the church with people to hear Christmas music. I understand that in movie editing, people can be added or subtracted by computer manipulations. But I want real people. How? Time is short! I've got it: I'll talk to

was worth it. Though I was tempted by the molten chocolate cake, as well as by the pumpkin cheesecake, I chose the crème brulée. It was superb, and the coffee was even better. I found out that they buy their coffee from the coffee shop across Gibbs Street, where one can easily get it every day – which I did from then on. On the whole, the service and food was great, with none of that Boston/Cambridge attitude that is so often served up around here – I'd give Max 94 points out of 100.

Christ Church's dedication ceremony for the instrument took place at their Sunday morning service. The playing was very good, and the volunteer choir did a good job. The only criticisms I have are that the service was overall too long, and that, even though I'll probably be labeled a Cretan for it, I simply cannot abide the practice of singing (German Lutheran) Chorales at such a slow speed (each note of the melody is essentially made into a whole note). Bill Porter is a fabulous player and improviser, but singing anything (in this case *Nun danket alle Gott*) at such a slow speed ruins the singers' ability to make a musical phrase, and is just plain too tiring. (And, imagine me, the lover of musicological studies, saying this: I really don't care if it is historically accurate or not!) No wonder the singing was like a loud braying donkey in 18th century Germany.

In the papers and lectures on Monday, we learned some new terminology for the process of recreation/restoration. "Restorative Conservation" is the idea of achieving a balance between full functionality and full documentation. We heard about both the "explicit" (scholarly/scientific/measurable) knowledge gained in the process of documentation and the "tacit" knowledge that can be gained in the workshop while attempting to recreate a given piece of technology.

There were really no displays (such as one sees at AGO conventions) except for the University of Rochester Press, and Wayne Leupold. I bought three books, which I've just begun reading:

French Organ Music from the Revolution to Franck and Widor by Laurence Archbold & William J. Peterson (University of Rochester Press)

Maurice Duruflé by James Frazier (also U. of R. Press)

An English translation by Lynn Edwards and Ed Pepe of Gustav Fock's *Hamburg's Role in Northern European Organ Building* (Westfield Center for Early Keyboard Studies)

There were also lots of great CD's for sale, but having already exceeded my allotted storage capacity for same, I was the picture of forbearance.

This year's EROI was also much larger than in the past – over 350 registered, compared with less than 100 in previous years. It was a well co-ordinated conference full of first-rate playing and lectures. I can see a future for conference co-ordinator Annie Laver as an organizer of National AGO conventions. Through the whole extended weekend, mixing with lots of organbuilders and musicologists, as well as with other organists, produced a creative atmosphere that (at least for me) was tremendously stimulating to my little gray cells. I can highly recommend this conference as part of any organist's continuing education.


