Arvo Pärt and Contemporary Spirituality Conference

Boston University, March 25, 26 & 27, 2010

To celebrate the 75th birthday of Arvo Pärt (born 11 September, 1935), Boston University is hosting a conference entitled 'Arvo Pärt and Contemporary Spirituality'. Jointly promoted by the School of Music and the School of Theology, with cooperation from the Boston University Humanities Foundation, the conference will examine Pärt's music using and developing cross-disciplinary methodologies drawing on media studies, theological studies and different analytical approaches to music. By working on issues of interpretation it endeavors to bridge the traditional gap between scholars and performers, and it directly addresses the largest group of people who come across Pärt's music: the audience. Who Pays You?

If you are like most BAGO musicians, you have at least one part-time job. The AGO National Council now recognizes that a majority of Guild members are part-time musicians, and they have established a task force to address needs and concerns unique to musicians employed in part-time situations. (See Jan TAO, page 6, and send your ideas and hopes to them, as requested.) Meanwhile, in addition to shoveling snow, it's time to be readying tax returns. If you don't already work with a financial planner and/or tax preparer, think seriously about it. Tax codes change, employment contracts change, benefits change, and you want to be sure to take full advantage of deductions and exemptions available to you.

While you're at it, review your income sources for clarity. Unless you have a contract that says otherwise, professional fees should come to you directly without administrative "slices" being taken along the way. Check your W-2 and 1099 forms (you *do* get 1099's, don't you?) to be sure of your employment status, and contact the employer to discuss any questions that arise.

It is important that professional musicians work to remain educated on financial issues as well as musical ones. If you have encountered an interesting situation – whether positive or unsettling – regarding those who pay you, please consider sharing the experience with your BAGO leadership. It is through education and mutual support that Guild members benefit most.

First Night Success

Dec. 31, members again took part in the annual First Night celebration, Boston's day long festival promoting art and community on New Year's Eve. The Chapter program was held at the historic Arlington Street Church and featured performances by three Chapter members: Brian Jones, Organist Emeritus at Trinity Church Copley Square; Rosalind Mohnsen, Immaculate Conception Parish, Malden, Mass; and Christian Lane, Assistant Organist and Choirmaster at Harvard University. The large crowd was treated to a holiday program of music "light and serious," featuring works of Vierne, Lefébure-Wé ly, Schumann, and many others. The concert concluded with Frederick Hohman's *Comic Variations on 'Good King Wenceslas.*' The event was organized by chapter member Rodger Vine.

Dean's Message: Part-timing, reconsidered, and an idea

In January, two items came to my attention at about the same time, both of which have a direct bearing on our work in religious institutions.

First, a newspaper article (yes, I still read those) reported on the findings of a Pew foundation poll on the importance of religion in people's lives, by state. The poll was built around four questions: How important is religion in your life; how frequently do you attended worship services; how frequently do you pray; how certain is your belief in God? (Yes, that latter with a capital G.) Guess what? In all four measures, the six New England states ranked at the bottom (along with Alaska). And, not surprisingly, the southern states were at the top.

For those of us living and working in these New England churches, none of this comes as a great surprise.

As we try to field volunteer choirs, especially children's choirs, and create meaningful, comprehensive music programs and activities in our churches, we see fewer people in church than we do outside it. And, of course, fewer people in church usually means less money to fund all church programs, including music. Given the numbers of closed churches, and cut-backs in those which stay open, church itself is becoming a part-time endeavor.

Which leads to my second, and foremost, item: the announcement from the national AGO of a new task force with a focus upon the part-time church musician. For the full story, see page 6 of the January issue of The American Organist (TAO). The gist of the task force's charter is to bring attention to the needs of that majority of AGO members who hold part-time church and/or synagogue positions. Reading through the TAO article's somewhat "purple prose", we see that the task force, in conjunction with local AGO chapters, will be working to develop programs and deliver services tailored to the part-time musician's needs.

Now one may be inclined to think, "Isn't this stating the obvious?". We in New England certainly know that few church positions in the region come anywhere near being what could be called full-time, meaning providing the work AND its concomitant compensation to be a person's only needed employment. But it is always good to have the points made in the article put in print in front of us.

For the BAGO as a whole, it is incumbent upon the Chapter to act upon those suggestions for information gathering about our membership as well as about potential members. It is also incumbent upon the BAGO to develop programs and workshops aimed at ALL levels of our part-timers (and those few full-timers). Frankly, nothing here is new, but what I hope is that the BAGO, with outstanding resources in our midst, might become a leading example in this effort.

Which leads me to an idea that I think it is time for this AGO chapter to consider. We have a very successful Young Organists Initiative. Why not now create an Adult Organists Initiative, with the same scheme: audition adults who want/need to learn how to play the organ, and provide scholarships for private study?

German Organist to Play in Boston

Jens Korndörfer, born 1978, has studied in Bayreuth, in Paris with Michel Bouvard and Olivier Latry, and at Oberlin with James David Christie, with highest distinction. He is currently pursuing doctoral studies at McGill University in Montreal under Dr. John Grew. While in France, he was Organist at the historic Clicquot organ in Notre-Dame des Vertus, Aubervilliers, near Paris.

Korndörfer has performed extensively in prominent venues, including Westminster Abbey in London, Notre Dame Cathedral and church of La Madeleine in Paris, Cathedral of St. Pierre in Poitiers, Chapel Royal at Versailles, the Dom in Lübeck, the Basilica in Saarbrücken, Suntory Hall and Metropolitan Art Space in Tokyo, Kyoto Concert Hall and St. Boniface in Cincinnati.

As the first German to be appointed Organist in Residence at "Kitara" Concert Hall in Sapporo, Japan, he gave regular solo performances and also concertized with the Sapporo Symphony Orchestra and the Filarmonica Arturo Toscanini under Lorin Maazel.

He has received numerous awards in Germany, France, the U.S. and Canada. In 2008 he was a finalist in the First Canadian International Organ Competition in Montreal. He will appear in upcoming recitals in the Kaiser-Wilhelm-Gedächtniskirche in Berlin, the Münster in Ulm and the Basilica Notre Dame in Montreal.

His first Boston performance will at St. Thomas Aquinas Church in Jamaica Plain on February 28. Please see the Concert Calendar for details.

Requiescant in Pace

Dick Lahaise passed away on January 3 at the age of 68. In the words of fellow organist Richard Hill, Dick was "a giant in the world of organ maintenance and restoration in the Greater Boston area." He and his brother Bob (who died in '83) maintained many of the great Hook instruments in Boston, including the magnificent E. & G.G. Hook & Hastings at Holy Cross Cathedral, and the Jamaica Plain Hooks. They were the fourth generation of Lahaises to do so. Dick never tired of talking about the Hook Brothers, and I don't think there was anyone alive who knew how Elias and George Hook thought as well as Dick did. Dick maintained approximately 120 organs in the Boston area.

A Funeral Mass was held on January 7 at St Theresa of Avila. Contributions in Dick's memory may be made to the charity of one's choice.

She and her husband later lived in Arizona for a few years before moving back to New England and settling in Portland, Maine, where Marilyn served churches in Portland and Augusta as organist, and became active in the Portland AGO Chapter. She also had taught piano for over forty years, and had operated a successful real estate business in Maine. A memorial service was held at St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Portland on January 9.
