#### Jean Langlais

Born on February 15, 1907, in a small village near Mont St. Michel, Jean Langlais became blind at age two. At age sixteen, he was sent to Paris to study at the National Institute for Blind Children, noted for its training of musicians, where he studied with André Marchal. At the Conservatoire de Paris he was in the organ class of Marcel Dupré, composition class of Paul Dukas, and improvisation class of Charles Tournemire, receiving major prizes in all three.

Jean Langlais returned to the Institute for Blind Children as a professor, for 40 years. He also taught at the Schola Cantorum, Paris, attracting students from France and around the world, including the Boston area. From 1945, he served 42 years as titular organist at Sainte-Clotilde.

Langlais died in 1991, leaving a catalog of 254 opus numbers covering a large body of organ music, vocal and instrumental sacred music, and secular music. His reputation as composer, teacher, improviser, concert and recording artist took him around the world, including the US, where he gave 300 recitals and countless master classes between 1952 and 1981.

#### About the Artist

Marie-Louise Langlais, born in Casablanca, received a law degree before joining the organ class of Jean Langlais at the Schola Cantorum. There she received the diploma of virtuosity for organ interpretation and improvisation in 1969. Following her marriage to Jean Langlais in 1979, she became his assistant at Sainte-Clotilde.

In 1985 she was appointed professor at the Schola Cantorum, and in 1988 she was named professor of organ and improvisation at the Conservatoire National de Région de Paris. As a concert performer and masterclass teacher, Mme. Langlais has toured extensively in Europe and North America. She has recorded music for solo organ, and for organ with orchestra.

In the workshop, Mme. Langlais will talk about Jean's life and music, and show a brief video. She also wants people to play. #### The Concert

Among the pieces on Mme. Langlais's program will be Jean's *Missa in Simplicitate*, for mezzo-soprano and organ, and *Trois Oraisons*, for mezzo, flute, and organ. The organ at St. Andrew's was completed in 2006, and is a large two-manual, much influenced by the French style.

# Organ Library News

The Instructional Technology division of Boston University is presently developing a program to make the Library's holdings (about 35,000 titles) available to performers and scholars throughout the world. It is hoped that this will be available over the Internet in early 2007. Additional titles will be added to the Webcatalog as new donations of music are offered to the Library. The Library has embarked on an ambitious program to supplement the book collection that assists those using the Library for research.

The Library's archival holdings include the legacies of many important performers. During 2006 the Library acquired valuable material from the estates of Searle Wright (original compositions in various genres and manuscript copies of music dedicated to or performed by Mr. Wright) and comprehensive documentation of the career of Catherine Crozier.

Finally, in addition to the music for sale on the Library's website (<u>organlibrary.org</u>), there are about 30 large, no longer needed three-ring binders in good condition that can be picked up free of charge or shipped at minimal cost. # Felix Hell's Bach Recitals at the Peabody Institute

On Friday morning, November 3, my husband Emery and I flew from Boston to Baltimore to attend the first four of Felix Hell's ten recitals presenting the complete organ works of Bach. We would have stayed for all ten recitals, but would be flying home Saturday night because I had to play for church on Sunday.

I do not know Felix personally, though I have heard him play a number of recitals, mostly at the Methuen Memorial Music Hall. I have spoken with him after each recital and have admired his gifted musicianship and friendly manner. I expected that Felix's Bach series would be memorable and of course my husband and I were rewarded by that sense of participating in a major life event, both for us and him.

Felix played beautifully in his musical, fluid, at-ease style. In the beginning recital the enormity of Bach's music began to reveal itself; then the recitals seemed to be a journey through Bach's life. Every piece belonged to every other piece. It is a compliment to Felix's open and unencumbered style of performance that Bach's music itself was radiant in these recitals. Two friends who were present for all ten recitals said that after concluding the tenth recital Felix was so overcome with emotion that he found it difficult to speak. I was not surprised to hear this.

At the recitals we enjoyed meeting other listeners who had traveled from Colorado, Pennsylvania and Methuen, Massachusetts to be there. They were from different walks of life, not all organists, yet each of them has been inspired by Felix's recitals since he was a young teenager.

I learned of the recitals from an online announcement, and the day I called Peabody to reserve tickets happened to be Felix's 21<sup>st</sup> birthday. Felix is a student at Peabody, and my husband and I were grateful to the Institute for hosting this event. The recitals were held in the midst of daily life at this great school; just being there was exciting.

I came home with two definite insights. First, I am resolved to let my listeners know how important they are to me. Felix is truly gifted at this. Second, for organists who have physical endurance on a marathon level, the playing of the complete works of Bach would be a worthy undertaking. In a year-long series, Christa Rakich and Peter Sykes played the complete keyboard works of Bach. I hope all organists who have a penchant for playing Bach will consider presenting the complete organ works.



## E-Newsletter!

This issue of the Newsletter represents a first step in bringing its delivery mechanism into the 21st century. As I'm sure all of you know, we have had increasing difficulty in getting the USPS bulk mail service to deliver the Newsletter in a timely manner. We have moved our posting date back twice - it is now mailed at least 10-14 days before the end of the month, yet there are still too many members who receive it after the first of the month, and in some cases, well after it. Given the Concert Calendar and other time-sensitive content, we felt this situation could no longer be tolerated.

Yes, we could use first class mail, but that represents a considerable extra expense to the Chapter when, in fact, the vast majority of the membership now has the ability to receive the Newsletter electronically via e-mail.

This issue is being experimentally sent to all members on the Chapter mailing list who provided an e-mail address when renewing last Spring. It will appear as an attachment to an e-mail from "BAGO-Announce" in PDF file format, with a name of AGOJAN07.PDF. PDF files are the de facto standard for transmission of complex documents over the Internet. To read the document, your computer will need to have a version of Adobe Reader® installed. Most computers will already have this program, but if you do not, you can download it from the following site: www.adobe.com/products/acrobat/readstep2.html

With Adobe Reader® you can view the Newsletter on your screen, or you can save it to your hard drive for later reference, or you can print all or part of it. Note that the PDF file you are receiving is the same file that is sent to the printer to produce the paper Newsletter - it is identical in all aspects. (It is also identical to the copy posted on the web site). And the best news of all is that your newsletter will now arrive at least 10 days before the month of issue!

We realize that there are members who will still prefer a paper newsletter, and this service will continue to be provided; however, in this Spring's renewal form, you will be asked if you prefer to receive the newsletter via e-mail. Starting in September, we will e-mail the Newsletter to those people who signed up, and drop them from the paper mailing list.

We are interested in your reactions to this process, and any suggestions you may have on how to improve it. Please contact the editor with any such feedback. We hope you will support this attempt to improve member communications while saving the Chapter money at the same time.


