This is the 3rd annual celebration of Bach's birthday featuring a series of recitals on the acclaimed Richards, Fowkes & Co. organ (Opus 10, 2000/2010) at Boston's First Lutheran Church. Last summer this organ was completed with three additional stops.

For the second year our celebration is joined with Emmanuel Music's, with sometimes overlapping events. Bach cantatas will be performed both at FLC and at Emmanuel.

We sincerely thank our recitalists: William Porter, Christa Rakich (both Bill and Christa have been Artists in Residence at FLC), Andrus Madsen, Heinrich Christensen, Bálint Karosi (FLC Minister of Music), Michael Sponseller (of Emmanuel Music) and Brett Maguire. Especially we thank Bálint and the many members at First Lutheran who are our helpful hosts throughout the day.

The music played in this year's recitals will be Bach's monumental *Klavierübung III*, sometimes called the *German Organ Mass*. The chorales on which the chorale preludes are based also will be played and sung, with our recitalists replicating various styles of 18th c. hymn introductions.

Former BAGO member Bernard Greenberg gives this description: "The 1739 third book of Bach's *Klavierübung* delivers the full blossoming of Bach's chorale-based forms, in many ways a by-product of his wealth of wildly inventive chorale-based structures from decades of cantatas. Rounded out with simple, *Orgelbüchlein*-like *manualiter* miniatures, the collection is remarkable for its wealth of experimental, idiosyncratic, and forward-looking large-scale forms. The diversity of its forms drives each of them as far as it can go, nay, further. In the workaday of frequent chorale-based composition in the cantatas, Bach had developed history's preeminent organ chorale-prelude art, and these are they; full-scale chorales composed with an agenda (the Catechism). The *Klavierübung* is in a way a mature companion to the *Orgelbüchlein*."

Nominees for Upcoming Chapter Election

In December, the Executive Committee approved the Dean's recommendation that David Carrier, Charlene Higbe, and Richard Bunbury serve as the Nominating Committee for the 2011 election. In accordance with BAGO operating procedures, they submitted the following slate at the Executive Committee's February 8 meeting:

The Membership Secretary and Treasurer are elected in odd-numbered years and hold office for a 2-yr term. It is recommended that they serve no more than two consecutive terms (4 years).

Membership Secretary: **Tim Hughes** (2nd term) Treasurer: **Joel Davidson** (1st term)

The Recording Secretary, Registrar, and two Auditors are elected annually and hold office for a 1-yr term. It is recommended that they should not serve more than three consecutive terms (3 years).

Recording Secretary: **Nancy Timmerman** (2nd term) Registrar: **Mark Slawson** (2nd term) Auditors: **Terry Halco** (2nd term), **Daryl Bichel** (1st term), **Claire DeCusati** (1st term)

The Assistant Treasurer is selected in even-numbered years for a 2-yr term. As Joel Davidson moves into the Treasurer post, this candidate would serve the second year of Joel's term.

Assistant Treasurer: Douglas Witte, David Cronin

Each year, four of the twelve Members-at-large are elected for a one 3-yr term. They may not serve a second consecutive term.

Member-at-large: Harry Huff, Bryan Ashley, Brandon Santini, Christine Hogan

Additional nominations may be made by petition signed by at least five Chapter voting members in good standing. Such petitions must be received by the Registrar (Mark Slawson) prior to April 1, or within thirty days after the notification of the members of the Nominating Committee's slate, whichever is later. Bios of the candidates will appear in the April Newsletter.

Indiana University professor **Jeffrey Smith** will lead a masterclass using the Schoenstein organ. He wants to de-mystify improvisation and remove the fear factor, while focusing on very practical things for all organists: hymn introductions, modulations, bridges, etc. (In conjunction with his improvisation recital on poetry of George Herbert at Church of the Advent, 30 Brimmer Street, Boston, Friday, April 8.)

Jeffrey Smith is Visiting Associate Professor of Church Music and Organ at Indiana University Jacobs School of Music. He has served as Canon Director of Music at Grace Cathedral, San Francisco, and Music Director of Saint Paul's K Street, Washington, DC. Dr. Smith is a graduate of Yale University, Northwestern University, and the Royal College of Music, London. He is a Fellow of the AGO and the Royal School of Church Music. He studied improvisation with Gerre Hancock and Philippe Lefebvre.

Call and Response

It's interesting that the primary definition of this phrase relates to interaction between two musicians. Examples are found in music from many sources, including gospel, rhythm and blues, and antiphony, coming from early cultural expressions found in Scottish, Indian, African, and Cuban settings. We've all experienced it, whether or not it's part of our everyday lives or regular religious observance.

Now think about this pattern in a wider context. Let's say you are called to play a memorial service, start a children's choir, participate in a parish retreat, try out a different musical style, exchange feedback with others, or involve newcomers in an established program – how do you respond? If the response is negative, the interaction stops and the possibility of expanding knowledge and understanding shuts down.

There are opportunities all around us for call and response - and we can be the ones to call as well as to respond. Guild membership is important if we want our Chapter to thrive - respond as you pay your annual dues (online this year!) and call other musicians to become AGO members. Our Chapter is hosting some major events in the next couple of years (POE and National Convention) - respond to requests for volunteers and call upon your musical colleagues to join you. Recently, the Nominating Committee has put together the annual ballot for leadership positions in the Chapter, and there have been some wonderful responses! Even if your name is not on the ballot this year, think of how you can be useful in supporting and furthering the work of the AGO, both in responding to a call to become involved in a specific way and, yes, calling on others who would enrich the Boston Chapter by their participation.

Remember that "Call and Response" is about interaction between musicians. May our rhythm of call and response be one that keeps the music going.

AGO Membership Procedures to Change

If you've been following Executive Director James Thomashower's columns in recent TAO issues, you're aware that, beginning with the 2011-12 AGO year, our membership process – for both new and renewing Members and Friends – will change significantly. Here's a recap of several important changes; further details will appear in subsequent issues of this Newsletter.

• Beginning May 15, 2011, Chapter members can renew online. There will be links to the renewal database from the Chapter website as well as from National's website. When you first log on, you'll be prompted to create your own account with a user name and password.

• If you're renewing, Boston's customized membership form will be populated automatically with your information – address, contact numbers, e-mail, degrees, certifications, interest in the substitute list, place(s) of employment, etc. (New members will use a drop-down menu to choose the chapter they wish to join.)

• You'll be able to update/correct your information at the time you renew, or at any time thereafter.

• You'll be able to make dues payments online by credit card, or indicate that you'll mail a check to National.

Questions? We're in the process of assembling a team of Chapter members who can assist you when it's time to renew. These Chapter members will be your liaison with National Headquarters. Please note: if you do not wish to participate in the online process, you will still have the option of completing a paper form and mailing your payment.

Next July 17-22, Boston and Cambridge will find about thirty enthusiastic and talented young people invading its churches, organ lofts, and organ chambers as the Boston chapter hosts two concurrent Pipe Organ Encounters: POE/Advanced and POE/Technical. Along



with students coming from across the country, ten faculty are drawn from distinguished undergraduate organ programs throughout the United States. All will be here to experience our area's wealth of organs, our organ builders, and the unique culture that is greater Boston.

The POE/Advanced is for students age 14-18 who already study organ and who are proficient beyond the beginner level. During the week, each student will study privately with two faculty members. Students will also participate in public masterclasses with faculty members, and in workshops focused on improvisation and church music skills.

The POE/Technical is for students age 16-23 with an interest in organ building. Their program includes workshops in the history, design, construction, and maintenance of the pipe organ. Students will visit the shops and work with the artisans of C.B. Fisk, Spencer Organ Company, and Nelson Barden & Associates. Students will also work on site during the installation of the new Fisk organ at Harvard's Memorial Church.

Students in both POEs will see many of the Boston area's finest instruments, and will hear faculty and young artists in concerts on these instruments. Plus, fun non-organistic activities are planned. Housing is in a residence hall of Suffolk University, in downtown Boston. All meals are included during the week.

Tuition per student for all of this? A mere \$450 (inclusive of housing and meals!). The total budget for the week? A mere \$39,800.....

It doesn't take a math degree from MIT to see a significant difference between the total of tuition from thirty students and the total budget, which we must raise in order to cover all costs. So far we've taken in \$4,500 from four major donors, but we still need to raise at least \$17,000. 
