On Sunday, November 7, Symphony Hall will open its doors to provide the greater Boston community an opportunity to welcome James Levine as BSO Music Director and witness the dedication of the newly renovated Symphony Hall organ. The day's events, running from noon to about 8:30

pm, will include a wide variety of performances and activities appealing to all ages and musical tastes. Members of the BSO and the Tanglewood Festival Chorus will perform, as will such local ensembles as the New England Conservatory Philharmonia. Keith Lockhart will be on hand for the festivities, and James Levine will lead music for brass and organ featuring the BSO brass section and organist James David Christie. The organ will be showcased in recitals by young German organist Felix Hell and acclaimed English organist Thomas Trotter, in silent film screenings accompanied by Jeff Weiler, and in a rendition of baseball tunes by a Red Sox organist from Fenway Park.

The Aeolian-Skinner organ, Opus 1134, is one of Symphony Hall's most prominent features. Built in 1947, the instrument was designed by G. Donald Harrison, the preeminent American organ builder during the first half of the twentieth century. When first installed, it was widely recognized as one of the most versatile concert hall organs in the world. Inaugural concerts with the BSO took place in October 1949 with renowned organist E. Power Biggs at the keyboard, and organ recitals were for many years a regular feature of Symphony Hall programming.

Completed this past summer, the renovation of the organ began in January 2003, when the entire instrument including some 5,000 pipes—was removed from the organ chamber, which has itself been completely refurbished. The renovated organ—now incorporating some new pipes and divisions, as well as a new console design—was reinstalled during the summer of 2003; tonal finishing and tuning was completed in the summer of 2004. Of equal importance to the renovation of the organ was the establishment of a permanently endowed fund for its care, enabling the BSO to remedy mechanical problems common to the aging process as they occur, and to undertake necessary cleaning and other maintenance on a regular basis.

Following its rededication, the organ will be featured during 2004-2005 in the BSO performances of Mahler's Symphony No. 8 that inaugurate James Levine's tenure as BSO Music Director in October, and in the season-closing performances of Respighi's Pines of Rome under Rafael Frühbeck de Burgos next May. It will also be used in Mr. Levine's November BSO performances of the final scene from Salome.

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Dean's Message

By now you have heard that the Boston Chapter will celebrate its centenary in December of 2005, and I hope you have also planned on being a part of the celebration. On page one of this newsletter is a reminder to contribute to the Centennial Fund; my job is to ask you to participate as fully as you can in the preparation and attendance of these events.

Part of our celebration is already going on – the Boston Chapter is sponsoring a hymn tune search, the goal of which is to choose a new tune that will become a lasting addition to the corpus of modern hymnody. We have a chosen a new text by Delores Dufner; the full text and the rules for the hymn search are posted on the chapter's website. You may also contact me if you find it difficult to gain access to the website. I am excited by the prospect of finding a good new hymn tune. The hymns that we play form the ground upon which we interact with many aspects of our calling – we share the words with our ministers, we sing those words with our congregations, and the melodies become the basis of much of the other music that we present in worship. I think it is most appropriate that we mark our centenary with a gift to ourselves and our congregations with a new hymn tune that binds these aspects of our profession together.

We take all of the wonders in this area for granted. I spent part of my summer helping the Old West Organ Academy, and the comment most often made by all of the out-of-town participants was that we in Boston are so lucky to have all these beautiful instruments, some of which are in fabulous buildings. When I travel around the country and tell other organists where I'm from, I am often greeted with sighs of longing and exclamations of "Oh, I wish I lived there!" We are so used to the riches of this area that we forget how lucky we are to be here. Let's not forget – let's enjoy what so many other people wish they could hear! So, come to the events, go to a friend's recital, and bring someone who may never have come to an organ recital before. If you see me there, come up and say hello – I'd love to meet you!

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Opening Worship Service

Our Chapter year began with a worship service filled with beauty and inspiration. Held at First Church, Unitarian Universalist, in Jamaica Plain, our service was led by the Rev. Terry Burke, minister of that church. Mr. Burke's style is a blend of liberal theology and formal liturgy, and I felt appreciative of both. The church is celebrating the 150th anniversary of their E. & G.G. Hook organ (Opus 171, 1854). From its rear gallery location, the organ sends sonorous, antique sound into the spacious room. Of particular interest is the sound of the three contrasting manuals.

Our service of course included much music. Rosalind Mohnsen played Concerto in G by Druckenmòller as the Prelude and the hymn *Come Down, O Love Divine*. Lois Regestein played *Voluntary for Two Manuals in D minor* by Purcell and three chorale preludes by Ernest Pepping. Ellen McGuire, organist at the church, accompanied a Sanctus, which closed a time of prayer. We stepped back in time as Lois accompanied a hymn (*O Thou, Whose Own Vast Temple Stands*): it had been sung at the dedication of the organ and building in 1854. Readings were from Isaiah 6, Colossians 3 and the writings of Martin Luther on "Music."

Our Chapter Chaplain, the Rev. Miriam Gelfer (Rector of Grace Church, Episcopal, in Newton), gave the homily. Miriam thanked us for the opportunity to be our Chaplain. She explained that her own career began as a public school music teacher; hence there is much about our work as organists and choir directors that she "understands." She repeatedly said "thank you" to us organists for our commitment, reliability, dedication, professionalism (even though "many of you do not make much money"), and cooperation for rearranging our schedules to play for funerals, etc. I wished that every Chapter member had heard her address. How welcomed it was to be acknowledged and thanked.

Our service closed with the Installation of Officers and the hymn *When In Our Music God Is Glorified*, accompanied by Robert Barney. Robert also played the Postlude, Sonata II by Mendelssohn.

We then adjourned to the Parish Hall and were feted at a reception. Thanks to Margaret Angelini, First Church and the many people involved in planning and leading this service. It was a hallmark of worship for the organist.

Organ Library Website Updated

The Organ Library website has now been updated. The structure of the site has not changed, but many more items have been added to reflect recent changes at the Library. Most of the score collection has been converted to a "Webcatalog," replacing the card catalogue, which has heretofore been the main point of access to the holdings of the Library. This cannot be accessed from the website at present, but it will be made available over the Internet sometime next year. The website offers brief descriptions of the book, periodical, and score collection, as well as a listing of all used organ music being offered for sale. AGO/Quimby Regional Competitions for Young Organists

Date: February 19, 2005 Place: All Saints' Ashmont

The purpose of this competition is to encourage younger organists to pursue excellence, to gain performance experience, and to receive recognition for their achievements. These competitions begin at the chapter level and conclude at the nine regional conventions. The winner of each regional competition will receive a \$1000 award and will be invited to perform at the 2006 National Convention in Chicago, Ill. There is also a \$500 award for second place. The AGO/Quimby Regional Competitions for Young Organists are made possible by a generous grant from Michael Quimby, President, Quimby Pipe Organs Inc. I strongly encourage all teachers to pass this information on to their students, whether they are members of the chapter or not! Membership in the AGO is encouraged, but not required, to compete.

Competitors must be under 23 years of age as of August 1, 2005, and must compete in the AGO region of their school or home. Applications, required repertoire and the official rules of the competition can be obtained from David Baker at dgb137@mac.com. Executive Committee Minutes Summary, September 20, 2004

Present: Angelini, Warner, Gray, Higbe, Gabler, Guzasky, Rice, Goda, Reddy, Hughes, Lebedinsky, Owens, Ambrosino, Christensen, Owen, Klein.

- 2. Treasurer's report. Printouts of 2003-2004 receipts and disbursements, along with budget figures for 2005-2005 were distributed. Not quite balanced, but workable. We were reminded that the last two or three years the balance has been improving, and we are in pretty good shape. Suggestions were made of ways to cut costs.
- 3. Membership Secretary reported that we have lost about 70 members this year, some perhaps due to increased dues. Reminders have been sent to non-renewed members. Rose Mary noted that some people on substitute list did not renew, and will contact them. It was noted that there were not as many ads in this year's Yearbook.
- 4. Registrar has sent reports of our meetings for publication in TAO. She has asked our chaplain, Rev. Gelfer, for a copy of the homily she gave at the opening meeting in Jamaica Plain, so that it could be published in the Newsletter.
- Dean Angelini commented on the successful opening meeting, and noted the loss of our good friends Ruth Steinmetz and Ralph Jonathan White.
- Committees:
 - Broadcast. Martin Steinmetz sent in a report that there will be some new material and some repeats in October.
 He is currently working on the November to January programs.
 - b. Competitions. Site will probably be All Saints Ashmont or St. Paul's in Cambridge; plans need to be filed by October 15. The competition must be held between February & April 2005, and the winner will compete at the Region I convention in Hartford. We all need to recruit potential competitors.
 - c. Examinations. About 12 took the SPC exam and nearly all passed; this is reflected in the new substitute list. Glenn has had some further inquiries for SPC, and one AAGO candidate. Glenn is now also the Regional Education Chair, and will be visiting other chapters.
 - d. Finance was discussed, with suggestions regarding membership increase, grants and donations, etc.
 - e. First Night plans are being made, with recitals by various members being given at Arlington St. Church.
 - f. Library. Two major collections of organ music from the estates of Searle Wright and Berj Zamkochian are being processed, and we were able to purchase a number of new books from Mrs. Henry Karl Baker for half price. Volunteers are still working on the web catalog, archives, and sale music.
 - g. Membership. Suggestions were made for attracting new members, and there was discussion of ways to get and keep younger members. Sally suggested a subcommittee to make welcoming calls to new members. Joyce noted

- that the MVAGO chapter had recently voted to pay half the first year's dues of first-time members.
- h. Newsletter. Jim Swist urges members to send material news, information, chapter happenings, etc. He has been asked to repeat the organ teacher list.
- i. Nominating. Larry will provide a 2005 slate in January.
- j. Organ Advisory. Dick Hill was not present but Barbara noted that the committee had made a couple of visits over the summer, and reported a "success story" – the Congregational Church in Swampscott, visited a couple of years ago, will be dedicating their new Noack organ on November 7.
- k. Placement gets 4 or 5 inquiries a month on average. New openings include St. Mary's in Holliston and the Episcopal Church in Winchester.
- 1. Professional Development. New guidelines appear in the current Yearbook. A meeting will be held September 26 to review compensation and the Green Book.
- Program committee will meet October 1. They would like more members. Margaret reported a meeting with the Centenary committee and distributed a proposed budget. Possible venues for Latry's recital discussed. Stuart Forster is organizing the choral festival at St. Paul's Cathedral for May 21. The Westminster Abbey Choir is scheduled for October 16 at Trinity Church (cosponsored). A lecture-recital on Franck by Jon Gillock is proposed for November, and the Centennial year will end with First Night. AGO Hartford has invited us to do something for the Regional Convention, and a recital by some of our young scholars was suggested. Potential texts for the hymn competition are being reviewed, and the chosen text will be posted on our website along with the competition rules. Winner will be sung at the choral festival.
- n. SPAC. The Centennial hymn search would like a grant for the prize money.
- o. Substitutes. Due to the institution of the SPC requirement, the list has been reduced to 14, but these are thought to be all good people.
- p. YOI. Scholarship auditions will be January 22, and the winners will play at Lexington and King's Chapel again, on July 1 and 5. Mary Sue suggested that members advertise these events locally among piano teachers and school music people.
- Heinrich again raised the possibility of a new "Communications Committee" which could include a good writer for press releases, a computer expert for web maintenance, etc. No action taken.
- 8. Margaret initiated a discussion of membership growth and outreach. How can we engage present members more, and attract new members, especially young people? A member survey was also suggested. No action taken.


