Are you interested in Boston Chapter history?

"The Story of the American Guild of Organists" by Samuel Atkinson Baldwin (H.W. Gray, 1946), was published on the 50th anniversary of the AGO. Chapter IV (pages 41 to 50) is the "Story of the New England Chapter," which puts together all of the events leading to chapters in New England (other than Connecticut), including Boston, which had apparently become the Massachusetts Chapter (before being known as the Boston Chapter), still being known as that in the 1946 Yearbook and Directory. Our Special Projects Advisory Committee issued a grant to support the public concerts at the Syracuse Legacies Organ Conference, at Syracuse University

March 29-31, 2019. This event honors the contributions of three individuals with important ties to Syracuse: legendary organ professor Arthur Poister, distinguished alumnus and composer Calvin Hampton, and Walter Holtkamp Sr., builder of the University's two large organs.
