From the Sub-Dean:

One of the pleasures of being an organist is being near people who know more than I do about Bach. Last week I remembered a conversation I had with Greg Crowell, formerly from Boston, now Grand Rapids, MI, about Bach's use of rhetoric and expression throughout his music. Then I had a chance encounter with Dr. Lisa Wong, a medical doctor and violinist who showed me several pictures of Dr. Albert Schweitzer's 1949 visit to Boston when the BS0, conducted by fellow Alsatian Charles Munch, played the Poulenc Organ Concerto with E. Power Biggs. The occasion was a fundraising concert for the hospital Dr. Schweitzer was building in



Gambon, Africa. Dr. Schweitzer used his powers of observation to imagine humanitarian efforts combining medicine and the desire to help others. The son of a Lutheran pastor and an organist himself, Dr. Schweitzer turned his powers of observation to music and detected the presence of theological symbols and recurring themes that could be heard in the music of JSB Though some of his many ideas have been eclipsed after more than a century, I remember my delight at receiving a grey volume of the Widor-Schweitzer edition of the Preludes and Fugues one Christmas when I was a teenager and the astonishment at discovering Dr. Schweitzer's very varied life. He combined his many interests into a lasting legacy. The conversation with Dr. Wong led me back to my conversation with Greg about the deep roots of expression and profound theology in Bach's music, especially when played on historic organs; and for that I am grateful. Schweitzer's musical legacy was broad and influential and started me

on a journey to understand the rich marriage of historic instruments, a lively rhetoric and the music of JS Bach.

This month we have our annual Bach Birthday celebration at First Lutheran where the Richards and Fowkes, Opus 10 will be heard all day long. Here is the link from First Lutheran: http://flc-bostonmusic.org/bach. Starting at 8 a.m. on March 18th, listeners can hear those recurring symbols as our colleagues play the music of JS Bach. Come, stay as long as you can, and listen, listen, listen. You'll learn a lot from the organ and players who have so much to share. The flyer is included in this email. This October we held the YOI Scholarship Auditions at Marsh Chapel, Boston University. We are pleased to report this year we had more candidates apply for the scholarship than ever before. Two of the winners were Owen Carter, 17 of Concord, and Savannah Curro, 15 of Arlington.

Owen Carter is a senior in high school currently living in Concord, MA. He has been



playing piano for ten years now, but until five years ago it was more of a background activity and only recently has he begun to study it more intensely. Owen enjoys playing Romantic era music slightly more than Classical period or Baroque, but still thoroughly enjoys listening to and playing all eras of classical music. Owen is interested in the organ because of its versatility and capability to produce a wide variety of distinct yet complementary sounds and colors. He only began to study organ about a month ago. Outside of music, Owen has academic interests in history, classics, and linguistics.

sings in the choir, competes with the cross-country team, and leads a community service


