About the Boston 2021 RCYO Competition

The 2021 Boston AGO/Quimby Regional Competition for Young Organists (RCYO) occurred virtually in April. Two competitors, Sienna Stribling and Marshall Joos, submitted their recordings in advance of the "actual" competition day, April 17, 2021. Boston AGO Chapter members Erica Johnson, Andrew Sheranian, and Steven Young served as judges for the competition and at a virtual Zoom conference on April 17, they discussed their impressions of the playing of the two competitors and agreed unanimously on the choice of the winner of the competition, Marshall Joos. The panel also recommended unanimously that a second prize not be awarded.



Following their deliberations, the judges met the Sienna and Marshall virtually via Zoom and were able to chat with the competitors and announce the results of the competition.

It is interesting to note that Marshall Joos had previously been declared the winner in the RCYO Boston 2019 competition. Marshall is from Somersworth, New Hampshire, and began his organ study at age 10 with Lorrie Dodson. Currently, Marshall is a student of Christian Lane of the Boston Organ Studio. Following his 1st place award in the Boston 2019 RCYO, Marshall was awarded 2nd place at the Northeast Regional Convention in Buffalo in July of 2019. In 2020, he was awarded the Jack Kent Cooke Young Artist's Scholarship and he was chosen to perform on the National Public Radio program, From the Top. Most recently, Marshall placed 2nd at the Northeast Regional Competition, also held virtually. In the autumn Marshall will continue his studies in organ at the Shepherd School of Music of Rice University in Houston where he will study with Ken Cowan.

Musings on the Virtual Orgelbüchlein Recital

I have finished listening to the premiere of the *Orgelbüchlein* BAGO project and want to offer my congratulations to all the performers. The only thing missing was the reception afterwards. The big plus in the recorded version was the chance to see so many different organs. But I still wanted to see everyone in person afterwards.

I gasped a little at the beginning when I heard the first piece I ever learned, the first prelude in the *Orgelbüchlein*: *Nun komm*, 599. Of course I was expecting it, but that piece always gets me. There is so much expressive material in these preludes; from quick, dancing feet to the plunge of despair, to bright hope for the future and the constant conversation between earth and heaven.

At the last BAGO *Orgelbüchlein* project which Lee Ridgway organized in 2000, my father drove from Minnesota as a part of a year of driving after my mother died suddenly. He loved the music of Bach, and the concert consoled him. He would have enjoyed this concert as well.

My warm congratulations again.
