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Meet the Executive Committee

Greetings!

Welcome to a new feature of our newsletter. We are asking members of our Executive Committee and of our Chapter to introduce themselves in our newsletter. This month we feature Stephan Griffin, Member-at-Large.

I grew up in Monkton, Maryland, a rural town roughly 25 miles north of Baltimore. My family sang in the choir at church, but it didn't stop there...they'd burst into song around the house, mid-conversation in the car (no, the radio wasn't on), and there was even more singing than usual if relatives came to visit. My first solo in church was *This little light of mine* around age 6 and eventually, I started playing melodies by ear on the piano. By age 8, my parents knew it was time for piano lessons. One Sunday afternoon, we went to a concert given by Virginia Reinecke and the Baltimore Chamber Orchestra. I don't remember what they played, but I do remember meeting Virginia after the concert and she was ecstatic to hear about my fascination with Grieg...we had just been introduced to the first *Peer Gynt Suite* in music class. A couple days go by and I'm sitting in her living room being interviewed for her studio. Fast forward five years and I've started playing in church, discovered how the Hammond B-3 works (thanks to a cousin), and joined the Maryland State Boychoir at the recommendation of a friend from school. Four years of rugby and zero hand injuries later, I'm finishing high school armed with eleven years of piano lessons, five years of serious



choral training, two years of voice lessons, and a year of pipe organ lessons from Frank Cimino, director of the Boychoir.

I arrived at BU as an undergraduate voice major with a plan to finish two degrees in five years, get a job in the corporate world, and do music on the side. The next semester I added organ lessons, and the following year I officially added a business major with a finance concentration.

The summer after my sophomore year was spent fully immersed in the business school. I enjoyed all of my classes, but they didn't hold a candle to rehearsals with Ann Jones or lessons with Susan Ormont and Peter Sykes. Then came my junior year. **insert dramatic fully diminished seventh chord** I decided to study abroad at the Royal College of Music and the experience completely ruined my amazing plan. In short, inspiration overload. By the time I left London, I knew that music was going to be more than just a side job. I returned to Boston energized and inspired, but I needed a new plan. Four grad school auditions and two senior recitals later, I still wasn't sure if I was going to be an organist or a singer. Thankfully, my teachers reminded me that I wouldn't suddenly lose one skill if I chose to pursue a degree in the other.

By August, I was starting a MMus in organ at the University of Texas at Austin with Gerre and Judy Hancock, and on the music faculty St. Stephen's Episcopal Boarding School. I was the chapel organist on Sundays, but during the week I taught voice and coached chamber music. I managed to keep my own voice in shape by singing in the UT choirs and as the bass soloist and chorus master for Ensemble Settecento (now Austin Baroque Orchestra).

Two years later, I found myself back in Boston doing a DMA in organ with Peter, studying conducting with Ann Jones, singing around town, and working as the Director of Music at Trinity Episcopal Church in Newport, RI.

Fast forward to the present day and I'm often asked if I consider myself more of a singer or an organist. In my response, I'll usually quote Jessye Norman who said, "pigeon holes are only comfortable for pigeons." I've finished my DMA, but still do a lot of choral singing, accompanying, occasional organ recitals, guest conducting, and oratorio solos. I'm in my third season at All Saints, Brookline, and in addition to AGO, I'm a member of the Liturgy and Music Commission for the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts and a Director-at-Large for the Association of Anglican Musicians. I couldn't be more grateful for the journey and the amazing teachers that I've had along the way.

Organ Library News



The Organ Library received a very large donation (10 large boxes) of organ scores in very fine condition from Dr. John Near, the editor for the A-R editions of all the Widor works. Dr. Near was a Boston University graduate who has retired to Florida.

The Library has added new web page for the recently digitized reel-to-reel tapes from E. Power Biggs' audio room. The digitization was paid for by the National HQ, which gave a grant to the OHS for this collaboration between OHS and The Organ Library. The work was done in the amazing facilities at The New England Document Conservation Center in Andover. We are still in the process of listening to and labeling all the recordings, but they are now all up on their own

page of the Library website. Some are just radio chat from the 1950s, but most are programs that EPB recorded that went out on the CBS Radio Network. This work is now considered historic! To visit the new webpage, [click here](#).

Addendum to the Operating Procedures

The Executive Committee has requested that an Addendum be added to the Chapter's Operating Procedures. This Addendum would be a repository for policies and practices of how committees operate. For example, one entry would be the policy that placement listings be published for 6 months or until the position is filled. Another example would be our child protection policy (e.g., the need for CORI certification, etc.). The benefit of adding an Addendum is that all information would be in one document.

The Addendum would be different than the Operating Procedures in that any changes to this portion of the document would only require Executive Committee approval. The changes would not need to be published to the Chapter Membership for 30 days before a change could be made. As an example, if the EC would want to expand placement listings from 6 months to 8 months, only an EC vote would be required.



Update on AGO HQ Policy on Child Safety

In our December newsletter, we published the proposed change in our Operating Procedures to add a Child Safety Committee. The 30 day comment period has closed with no changes or edits to the proposal. The Executive Committee will vote on this addition at the next EC meeting February 8th. More information will be provided in upcoming Pippings.
