A Message from your Sub-Dean



Dear David,

Woman Composer Sunday is March 10, 2024. In a recent Facebook post encouraging organists to pick repertoire by women, it was interesting to read some people's comments about this topic. While some people were very supportive, "Every Sunday should be Women Composer Sunday!" and "Here are titles of some beautiful pieces I'm playing," others had questions such as: "Why is Woman Composer Sunday is replacing the Fourth Sunday of Lent?"

While I don't really think of myself as a composer, I do often find myself as the only woman in a room filled with organists. I have great respect for my male colleagues, but it can be lonely at times. In October of 2014, the results of an AGO national membership survey indicated that

of the members born in the 1930s, 47% were male and 53% were female, but of the members born in the 1970s and 1980s, 74% were male and 26% were female. Why the decline in women in younger generations, and what can we do to change it?

In the April 2015 TAO, Nancy Cooper writes: *Imagine a young woman paging through TAO,* wondering about how women are represented in our organization as a whole? What might she infer from what she sees? Would she find role models in our workshops, our recital series, our large metropolitan church jobs, and our collegiate organ programs, or would she conclude that all these are still dominated by men? And based on this contemplation, would she be likely to attend a chapter meeting if given an invitation?



If we want to reverse the trend of decline among numbers of organists and members in the AGO, we can start by making sure that women have a seat at the table and that we are including their compositions in our repertoire in all types of venues: concerts, worship services, and study. (And to my non-binary friends out there: I see you too!) Not only do I encourage you to take one weekend a year to highlight music by women, I would encourage you to look at your repertoire for every event and make sure there is a diverse array of voices represented. It's not an either-or choice; it's simply a widening of what we can offer all the ears who are listening. There is so much beautiful music out there - I hope you will share your favorites with the world!


