Aiming High for YOI

BAGO's Young Organists Initiative (YOI) is a long-standing program of the chapter, and currently a high priority for our Executive Committee. Until his death in 2022, John Dunn gave annually to completely support YOI. Now new donors are needed to make an investment in the future of our profession.

You have an exciting opportunity to join a small group of annual donors to support the YOI. Four BAGO members have already agreed to give \$1,000 annually. The goal is to raise \$7,000 each year. We're accepting annual pledges for \$250, \$500, \$750, and \$1,000 or more. A pledge is not a lifetime commitment. If you decide to withdraw from your annual pledge at some point, we'll

find a new donor to take your place.

Admission to the YOI program is by audition. Youth receive a \$1,000 scholarship for private organ lessons, participate in one or two masterclasses, are given free memberships in the AGO, and have the opportunity to play in a recital at King's Chapel in June following their year of study. There are events that connect them with organists too, including BAGO's Emerging Artists program. The YOI experience gives them a trajectory to follow as they progress through their studies.

There are many YOI graduates who have excelled in the field. An example is Savannah Curro, who recently completed a dual degree in organ performance and history from Mercer, studying with Jack Mitchener. She is now enrolled in a masters degree program at Yale University.



Wellesley Organ Crawl and Tuner Talk (with coffee, donuts & lunch) Saturday, May 11, 8:45AM-12:45PM

Come to Wellesley for a varied Saturday of organ nerding out.

First, we'll gather at St Andrew's Episcopal Church, Wellesley (the church parking lot is one block southwest of the Church, on the same side of Washington Street). After coffee and donuts, we'll have a brief demonstration of the 2006 Juget-Sinclair organ. Afterward, organ technician Jonathan Ambrosino will lead "Tuner Talk," a brief guide on how best to communicate

organ troubles to your organ service people. He'll also answer basic questions on pipe organ maintenance.

From there, attendees can walk or be driven to Houghton Chapel at Wellesley Chapel, to explore the 1981 Fisk organ in Houghton Chapel. The courageous among us can foot-pump the organ while others play, and College Organist Erica Johnson will be on hand to explain the meantone tuning system and what all the additional accidental keys do. Opus 72 was the last organ Charles Fisk finish-voiced before his death in 1983.

Finally, those who wish to gather for lunch will return to Saint Andrew's. There will be sign-up opportunities for lunch prior to the event, for those who pre-register. A separate email will be sent closer to the date with links to register.



Responsibilities and skills for this role:

The Social Media Coordinator gathers and publishes items and information for the benefit of the members of the Chapter. Examples include meeting announcements, notices of upcoming events, and missives (communications from the Dean, EC, etc.). The Coordinator also serves as Editor of the Chapter Newsletter ("Pipings"), ensuring its timely publication and distribution. The individual works closely with the Sub-Dean, Advertising Committee, and Webmaster, whose duties overlap with, and are dependent upon, the chapter's Social Media apparatus. Proficiency in EC approved social media platforms (currently Facebook, YouTube, Constant Contact) will help ensure the success of the individual occupying this role.

I'd like to invite anyone interested (who feels they possess the requisite skills to effectively carry out the role) to explore with the EC service to the chapter through the role of Social Media Coordinator.
