On Saturday, April 20, twelve of us met in Needham for the Ortloff Organ Shop Tour. Principal and founder Jonathan Ortloff spent the morning showing us around the shop, explaining some of his organ building techniques and describing recent, current, and future projects. The highlight for many was a thorough demonstration of voicing a few pipes from the new pedal mixture for his current project at Trinity University in San Antonio. It was a fascinating to see the magic of this process! If you wish you had been there, don't worry: we are planning another shop tour in early 2025. Less than a week later, chapter members found themselves enjoying the *Stars and Planets* concert in collaboration with Seraphim Singers and the Youth Choir from First Church in Belmont (with Ian Garvie, director). This program was built around Peter Sykes' brilliant transcription of *The Planets*, alternating between Holst's movements and anthems on shared themes by composers such as Timothy Takach, Patricia Van Ness, and Jonathan Dove. Peter was assisted by former BAGO Dean Victoria Wagner; together they built a masterpiece of sound on the 2018 Schoenstein & Co. Opus 178, a three

manual, 25-stop instrument designed in the Anglican tradition. They shared the bench with Heinrich Christensen, who accompanied Seraphim Singers and then brought the audience to their feet to join in singing Richard Proulx's setting of *O God, Beyond All Praising*.





This was the final concert for Jennifer Lester (also a former BAGO Dean) as Seraphim's Music Director; the standing-room-only audience did not hold back their gratitude for all of her contributions to Seraphim and BAGO. Following the concert, we enjoyed a reception put together by Daryl Bichel, featuring his out-of-this-world Galactic Brownies, Cosmic Popcorn, Stardust Cookies, and a Solar System Cake, complete with mocktails and great conversation.

The next morning, our Young Organist Initiative scholarship recipients met with Heinrich Christensen at King's Chapel for a masterclass. Keep reading to find out more about this fun event for our youth.

I hope to see you on May 11 in Wellesley for our next event: an organ crawl that will feature two very interesting instruments and Jonathan Ambrosino's "Tuner Talk!" More information is below.

Young Organist Initiative News

On Saturday, April 27, all three of our current YOI students met at King's Chapel for a masterclass with Heinrich Christinsen. Ilario Faienza (6th grade), student of Jeremy Bruns, began the session with *Élégie* by Léon Boëllmann and *Verse* (Anon. Italian, 18th century). Liam Cummings (8th grade), also a student of Jeremy Bruns, played *Prelude* by César Franck and *Prelude in C Major*, BWV 553, attributed to J.S. Bach. Ravi Burtner (10th grade), student of Cathy Meyer, finished the class with the *Prelude and Fugue in F Major*, BWV 556, and *Elegy* by Samuel Coleridge-Taylor. Heinrich worked with them on technique, gave them ideas for articulation, fingering and phrasing, and gave each of them the chance to try pressing pistons, as the organs they all have lessons on are completely mechanical. 
the masterclass, the students, along with their families, went out for tacos and fajitas with Heinrich and Cathy, giving everyone the opportunity to form new friendships.

10:15AM walk to Houghton Chapel at Wellesley College (a carpool will be offered upon request)


10:45AM demonstration of the 1981 Fisk organ
